Former Bank Employee Gets Three Years

MILWAUKEE — (U.P.)—Charles V. Morrissey, former assistant cashier of the Oconto County State bank, Oconto Falls, faced three years' imprisonment today after pleading guilty in federal court to seven charges of embezzlement and false entries.

Morrissey, father of three children, admitted taking \$8,106.37 from the bank between June, 1936, and the time of his resignation in January. He was unable to explain how he spent the money.

Testimony at the trial revealed the assistant cashier was paid \$90 a month and received \$30 a month as war veteran's disability compensation.

Judge Patrick T. Stone, who passed sentence, said that banks which paid low salaries were placing temptation in the way of their employes, but added that this constituted no justification for Morrissey's theft.

He sentenced Otto O. Wundtzel, 46, Green Bay, to a year and a day in prison and fined him \$100 for stealing a \$5 money order from the bank but suspended the prison part if Otto quit his job within a year.
