Wrestlers Do Stuff for Camp Fund

Jimmy Demetral will battle a young man for the good of youngsters tonight when he wrestles Johnny Bear at Breese Stevens field in the main event of a four-bout wrestling show for the Kiddie Camp, Madison health project.

The show, the first outdoor card of the season, is to open at 8:30 and will present four bouts instead of the usual three because Demetral is anxious to draw a large crowd.

The veteran Greek, who has staged nine previous annual benefits for the Kiddie Camp, will donate his share of the gate receipts tonight. Since he arranged the matches, he took an unusually large supply of trouble when he signed to meet Bear in the main bout, for Bear, agile Iowa youth, was the ablest foe Demetral met all winter.

'Suicide Well' to Become New Arboretum MILWAUKEE—(U.P.)—Authorities prepared today to convert the bottom of the city hall's 'suicide well' into an arboretum.

The council voted 17 to 9 to place potted plants on the first floor of the city hall. The garden was designed to keep persons off of the way of falling bodies.

Five persons have died during the past year as the result of suicide leaps from upper floor railings into the building's well. In one of the fatal jumps a spectator plunged narrowly by the plunging body and later died of shock.

Yugoslavia and Germany in Finals

(By United Press) It will be Yugoslavia against Germany in the final of European zone Davis Cup tennis eliminations.

The Yugoslav team split Monday's singles matches to advance 3-2 over Belgium. Franjo Puncic defeated Pierre Geelhand in straight sets, 6-3, 6-3, 6-3, to clinch the issue for Yugoslavia, and Andre Lacroix salvaged the meaningless last match for Belgium by beating Draucutin Mitich, 6-3, 6-2, 6-8, 6-2.

Germany completed a clean sweep in the best-of-five series with England by winning both of Monday's singles matches. Georges Von Metaxa downed Frank Wilder, 6-6, 6-0, 6-2, 6-3 and Roderick Bengel defeated Ronald Shayer, 6-2, 6-1, 6-0.

Guldahl's Odds Lowest Ever Quoted

(By Jack Cuddy) (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK—(U.P.)—Col. Tom Watterson of Louisville has been making book on the U. S. Open and other golf classics for the past seven years. But never has he registered such low odds against a contestant in any tourney as the 6-1 he quotes now against Ralph Guldahl's chances of winning the Open for the third straight time this week.

Before Watterson departed today for Philadelphia, where the Open will be played Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, he explained: 'I've got Ralph at 6-1 because he murdered me so often in the past. I can't take any more chances with him. Although Ralph finished fifth in the Goodall round-robin Sunday, you've got to rate him top for any tourney he enters.'

Cooper's Odds Shorten Col. Tom, a soft-spoken, rather portly chap in a large black hat, said Guldahl is the greatest golfer he ever saw. His outstanding quality of greatness is his ability to concentrate on any shot, despite pressure. It seems that Ralph's repeat victories in the Open last year and in '37 took Watterson over the jumps. That's why he is quoting 6, 4, 2, and even against big Ralph's chances of finishing first, second, third, and fourth this time.

Meanwhile, 'Light Horse Harry' Cooper's odds have been shortened a bit because of Harry's victory Sunday in the Goodall at Fresh Meadow. Cooper has been panned from 14-1 to 10-1, and placed at that quotation in the second-choice bracket with Sammy Sneed and Henry Picard, winner of the Metropolitan Open.

Cooper's victory wasn't the only reason for the abbreviation of his price. It seems that the lads who wager on golf posture pool realize that 'Light Horse Harry' is playing 'hot' golf right now, hence Cooper is sharing the heavy backing, along with Byron Nelson of the Reading, Pa., one of the year's leading money miners.

Wagering Drops This Year Thus far, Watterson has received little play on Guldahl, Sneed, or Picard, but he can't take chances on them as he is doing with Nelson whom he leaves in the next bracket at 14-1, along with Ed Dudley, Dick Metz, and Ben Hogan.

Col. Tom says wagering on the open is not as heavy this year as last, largely because western bettors are risking only about half as much. 'Westerners who sent in \$100 last year, are making it \$50 this time,' he explained. 'And so on. I don't know what's the cause of it, unless the boys out west are harder pressed for dough. The east is about the same. I expect the play to pick up today and Wednesday.'
