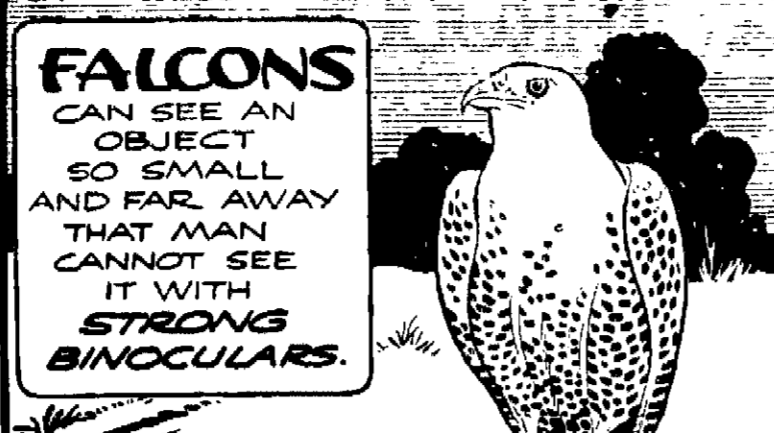

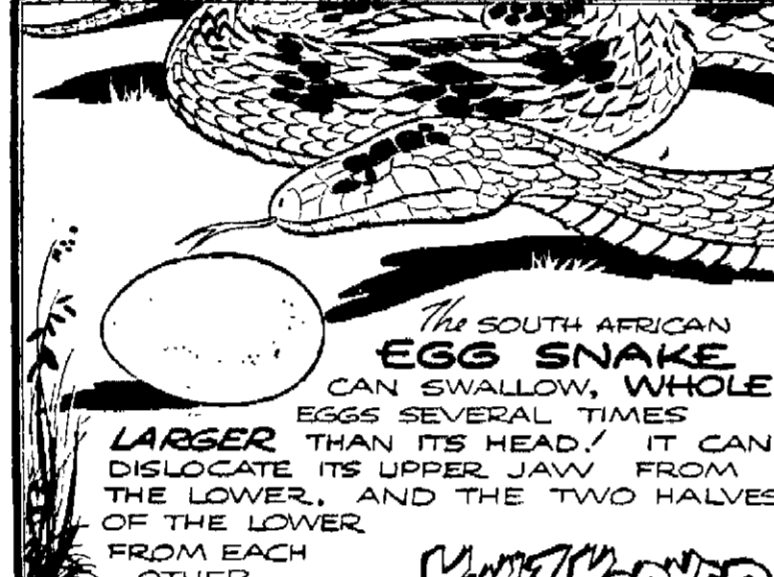

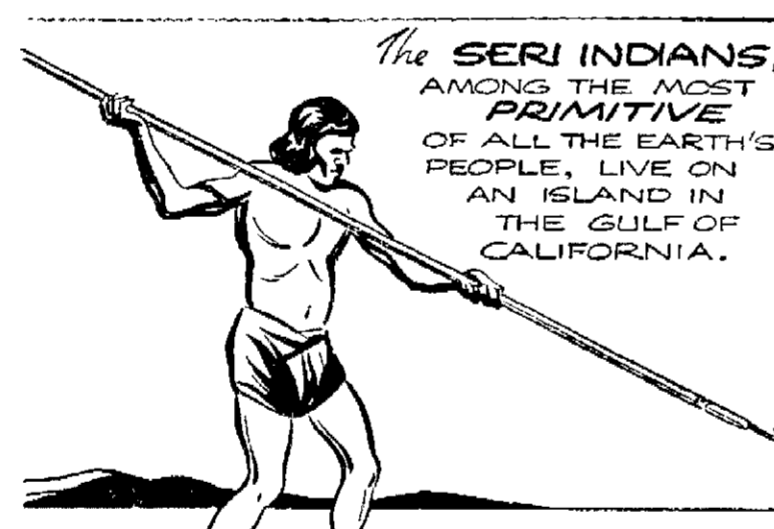

Regulation Of Pollution To Be Big Issue

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 19.—(AP)—Legislation to allow interstate regulation of stream pollution in the Ohio and Delaware watersheds likely will become a major issue of the next special session of Pennsylvania's general assembly.

Administration officials expect the extraordinary session to be called early in 1940 for the primary purposes of providing more relief funds and adjusting the state's tax program.

Two measures, authorizing Pennsylvania to enter into compact with adjacent states guaranteeing sanitation standards and stream pollution control on the Delaware and Ohio rivers, and their tributaries, were killed in the 1939 legislature.

Elwood J. Turner, Republican speaker of the house, accused Sen. Oscar T. Tallman (R-Lehigh), of blocking legislation affecting the Delaware watershed.

Both bills died in Tallman's state government committee in the senate, after passing the house.

The other bill, introduced by Rep. Elmer J. Holland, Pittsburgh Democrat, would have allowed Pennsylvania to enter into a compact with eight states along the Ohio valley, setting up an Ohio river valley water sanitation committee.

Other states, most of which have ratified the compact or have legislation pending, include New York, West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, Illinois, Tennessee and Indiana.

The compact would guarantee stream sanitation and regulation of industrial water rights along the Ohio's two principal tributaries in Western Pennsylvania, the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers, where federal engineers now are establishing five flood control reservoirs.
