Session Expects 4,500

An enrolment of approximately 4,500 students is expected for the 41st annual summer session of the University of Wisconsin, it is in-dicated by the large number of inquiries and requests for summer school bulletins received at the office of Scott H. Goodnight, dean of the session.

With the number of inquiries and requests for bulletins so far this year, about the same as last year at this time, it is expected that enrolment in the 1939 summer school at the University of Wisconsis will equal last year's when about 4,500 students were enroled in summer studies.

Classes in the 1939 general summer school for undergraduates and for graduates open next Tuesday morning, June 27, and continue weeks, ending on Aug. 4, while the nine-week courses for graduates only end Aug. 25. The law school opened its 10-week session Monday and closes on Aug. 25. Registration for this year's summer school begins Saturday,

and continues through Monday.

More than 300 members of the Wisconsin faculty and 32 outstanding teachers from other institutions of higher learning in a dozen different states will make un the faculty of this year's summer school. Virtually all of the hundreds of courses of study to be offered in the 1939 summer ses-sion are of academic grade and carry credit toward all degrees regularly offered by the univer-

The courses of study are planned to meet the needs of graduates and undergraduate students of colleges, technical schools, and universities; of teachers and sup-ervisors in secondary schools, normal schools, colleges and uni-versities; and of professional men and women. The graduate courses of nine weeks duration are offered again this summer to enable graduate students to make more rapid

progress toward their degrees. Many of the courses to be of-fered students again this summer have been "modernized," that is, especially planned or modified to meet the unusual conditions of the present time. 
