

Unique Broadcast Planned As Preview Of Berlin Film

International Program To Be Heard From Three Continents Monday Night On Magic Key Hour

An international broadcast Monday from three continents to be carried over WJZ thruout the United States and by short wave to Cuba and South America, has been planned by Hollywood as a preview of the Irving Berlin picture, "Second Fiddle."

This is the first broadcast of its kind ever arranged for a motion picture and it will be a departure from the type of radio programs the company has used in the past.

This international broadcast, which will inaugurate the new Monday night series of the Magic Key of RCA from 7:30 to 8:30 p. m. will be picked up from Norway, London, Buenos Aires, New York and Hollywood. It will feature music and scenes from "Second Fiddle" and will present the stars of the picture, Sonja Henie and Tyrone Power, as well as Rudy Vallee and Mary Healy, also members of the cast. Irving Berlin, the composer and Sidney Lanfield, the director.

A feature of the program will be a long distance air scene between Sonja Henie and Tyrone Power, separated by more than 7,000 miles. Miss Henie who sailed from New York recently, will be in her home in Oslo, Norway and Power will be in the studio in Hollywood.

In an effort to awaken interest in the Wagner Bill authorizing the increased entry of alien juveniles, Burgess Meredith, Katherine Hepburn and perhaps Shirley Temple or Deanna Durbin will make a special broadcast over WEAF Sunday.

Metropolitan Auditions of the Air has been signed for 26 additional weeks. Beginning Oct. 1, 1939, the program will be heard over the Blue instead of the Red network.
