Journal Photo Contest Now On 'Snapped' Up in a Tree



Animals have expression—just like people—and their expressions help make appealing pictures. Try "informal portrait" snaps of your pet—the wistful puppy, the kitten bursting with curiosity or playfulness, the older cat investigating an interesting mouse-hole or bristling at an intruding dog.

Pets provide picture chances galore—and there's a natural appeal in pet pictures which make them ideal snapshot contest entries. Include a group of pet snapshots in the pictures you enter in The Wisconsin State Journal snapshot contest.

Deadline for entries in the first contest is noon Thursday, July 6. Twelve dollars in cash awards await the winners, with an added opportunity of being eligible in the \$10,000 Newspaper National Awards contest in September.

Snapshot-Contest Rules

- ONE—The contest is strictly for amateurs. Anyone is eligible except employees of the Wisconsin State Journal and their families, and individuals or members of families engaged in the manufacture, sale, commercial printing or professional use of photographic equipment.
- TWO—Entrants may submit as many pictures as desired at any time during the period of the contest. (See paragraph 8.)
- THREE—Pictures must have been made after May 19, 1939.
- FOUR—Your snapshots may be made on any type of film, but must not be made on glass plate negatives. Any make of camera, film, chemicals, or paper may be used.
- FIVE—All pictures shall be judged by the National Awards Society on general interest and, or appeal, photographic excellence or technique, while important, will not be the deciding factor in determining prize winners. The decision of the judges shall be accepted as final.
- SIX—Before receiving the Wisconsin State Journal final prize in one or more of the four classifications, entrants must submit the original negative with print and sign a statement that his picture or a closely related animal is the subject of the picture and that the picture or situation has not been and will not be entered by him in any other snapshot contest.
- SEVEN—To enter the contest, mail a print or prints of as many pictures as desired to the contest editor, The Wisconsin State Journal, on the back of each picture print your name and address clearly in ink and the class to which you wish the picture entered. (See classifications.)
- EIGHT—No prints will be returned. Do not submit negatives with your prints. Keep them until requested by the Amateur Snapshot Contest editor. (Only original negatives accepted.) This newspaper assumes no responsibility for negatives.
- NINE—The Wisconsin State Journal will pay \$2 to the winners in each classification and \$1 for each picture of special merit that is printed and not awarded a prize, in addition to the prize for the final winner in each of the four classifications listed below. These four winners then will be entered in the National Awards contest which will compete for prizes totaling \$10,000.
- IMPORTANT: If you snap a picture which you expect to enter in the contest and in which a person or persons appear, be sure you get their names and addresses. This is necessary because before your picture can become eligible for another prize in the National Awards the written consent of such person or persons to the use of the picture for advertising purposes must be obtained.
- Following are the classifications in which prizes will be awarded weekly and at the end of the contest:
 - CLASS A, Children and Babies: Any picture in which the principal subject is a child or children.
 - CLASS B, Sports, Hobbies, Recreations, Avocations, Vacations, Action Pictures: Any picture of another person, animal, or object, such as golf, tennis, motor boating, canoeing, sailing, beach sports, airplanes, fishing, bird photography, gardening, farming, etc.
 - CLASS C, Scenes and Still Life Studies: Landscapes, marine views, city streets, travel or country scenes, architecture, interiors, "still life," still life art objects, corners, cut flowers, fruit, etc.
 - CLASS D, Informal Portraits of Adults: Pictures of one or more persons (close up or full figure) in natural and apparently unposed attitude; character studies; kenne (illustration of common life), and pictures in which charm and personality of the subject are outstanding.
