It seems that "Two-Ton" is faring differently from most of the cauliflowered clouters who were belted out by "Brown Bomber" Louis. Most of them drifted quickly into permanent pugilistic obscurity. They were washed up completely as far as the big time and the big money is concerned. But not Domenick Anthony Ga-

lento.
The barrel-built battler of Orange was stopped by Louis in the fourth round on June 28. Since then, here's what has happened, according to Manager Jacobs:

What caused this "We-Want-Galento" movement? "Yussel-the-gimmick" said the following reasons made Tony "da peepuls cherce".

"... public got wise ... " (1) Although Galento was stop-

ped by Louis in the fourth round, he gave the champion such a beat-ing in the first and third sessions, that the nations sports writers wrote all about what Tony had done to Joe on the night of the fight. And it wasn't until a couple lays later that the public discovered that Louis had won the fight. (2) Even after this discovery, when the fans saw the fight movies, they realized then that the sports writers actually hadn't dwelt enough upon what Tony had done to Joe. 

The logic of this is clear. Your partner did not have to keep the bidding open with a worthless hand to avoid making a business or penalty bass, as the opponent had done that work for him.


