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Verona Postmaster Arrested

Otto J. Petraske, removed from office last spring as postmaster at Verona, was arrested Monday on a federal court indictment charging embezzlement of postoffice funds.

He pleaded not guilty before U. S. Commissioner J. J. McManamy and was released on \$1,500 bond. U. S. Atty. John J. Boyle outlined the total of Petraske's alleged misappropriations at \$1,000 to \$1,200.

Seven other arrests on indictments returned here by the federal grand jury June 29 were announced today.

Lyle L. Lenth, salesman for the Sherman Nursery co., Charles City, Iowa, is in jail at La Crosse in default of bond on a charge of mail fraud in connection with alleged collection of advance commissions on fake orders for nursery stock. He was arrested at La Farge, and was released on bond.

Four persons were arrested on conspiracy charges in connection with Work Projects Administration projects, and two others for alleged thefts of bank funds.

Norman G. Long and Esther E. Long, Eau Claire, officers of the Zenith Sales co., were freed on bond pending appearance on a charge of conspiracy to pay payrolls on a WPA project. The company had a contract with Eau Claire county for electrical wiring of a new courthouse.

The indictment alleges they submitted a payroll representing payment of \$28 to Stanley Bergdoff, electrical foreman, whereas, it is claimed, Bergdoff was paid only \$14.56.

George Luther and Stuart B. McCauley, arrested at Tomahawk and released on bond, are charged with conspiring to defraud the government by using WPA labor for their own benefit.

Henry Olaf Dahl, bookkeeper at the Security State Bank, Baldwin, is accused of having abstracted approximately \$8,000 of bank funds by means of falsified entries.

Elmer Tranton, assistant cashier of the First National bank at Rib Lake, was arrested at Merrill on a charge of misappropriating about \$3,800 by juggling accounts of depositors.

Both Dahl and Tranton furnished bonds.

All But Two Rescued as Ship Sinks

SAN FRANCISCO—(UP)—The Nippon Yusen Kaisha liner Bokuyou burned and sank in the North Pacific ocean, 1,100 miles east of Tokyo today, but all passengers and crew members except two were reported rescued by the Associated Oil co. tanker Associated, the San Francisco Marine exchange said early today.

The ship, operated by the Japanese mail line in the South American service, carried about 120 passengers, all third class, and 104 crew, according to I. Nishimura, NYK agent in Los Angeles. It sailed from San Pedro July 2 for Yokohama, where it was due Wednesday.

Advices received by the marine exchange said the two chief officers were the only persons lost when the ship sank.

Woman Fined, License Revoked for Drunk Driving
PRAIRIE DU CHIEN—A Wauzeka woman, Mrs. Verma Boyd, was fined \$25 and costs and had her driver's license revoked for six months in county court here Monday on a charge of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor as a result of a collision between a car driven by her and one driven by Edgar Lihs, Prairie du Chien.

Mrs. Boyd's car sidswiped Lihs' automobile.

Both drivers and three passengers were bruised and shaken.

Patterson, Bloomington, whose car Mrs. Boyd drove, was also fined \$10 and costs in county court for being drunk on the highway. He was riding with her.

Monday's meager addition of 14 of an inch of Madison's seasonal precipitation may be augmented by more showers Wednesday, Eric R. Miller, government meteorologist, announced today, and the weather will continue cool.

The mercury reached 60 for a high point Monday and 68 for a minimum this morning.

A low pressure area extending over the middle-west south of Wisconsin today and another in Alberta and Saskatchewan produced rain in the northwest, Lafayette, Ind., recorded 4.12 inches. While scattered showers noted elsewhere on the map, more rain for Madison is a good possibility, Miller said.
