NEW YORK, July 22-(AP)-A 60-year-old coffee importer was seized in his Bronx apartment today after a shooting and stabbing foray which left his wife dead, his children badly frightened from stray shots and himself with a scissor wound in the chest.

Assistant District Attorney George Carney said the man, Arthur Spiropules, shot and killed his wife, Angelica, 47, emptied his 38 calibre pistol with three wild shots at his daughter, Jennie, 16,

and then stabbed himself. Detectives Timothy Mara and George Buddemeyer said Spiropulos told them the shooting followed an argument in which he accused his wife of having been overfriendly with a cousin.
