Prospects are, they told the United Press, that business for the year as a whole will show important gains over last year but will be substantially below 1937, the peak New Deal year. These factors were cited by the experts as the basis for the ex-

pected improvement: ONE. Increased government expenditures. Government spending is usually heavier in the first half of the fiscal year which begins July 1, than in the second half.

TWO. Continued expansion in the construction industry, particularly in the field of residential

THREE. Better relationship between incomes and retail prices, resulting in improved purchasing power for consumers. The economists pointed out in a

It seemed a cinch that he would stick with the Yanks in '38, after striking out 572 during his four seasons on Yankee farm clubs. But he didn't stick. So he was sent back to Newark during the '38 season for further seasoning, when the 23-player limit bore down.




