

Britain, France Speed Peace Moves, Hasten Rearming

Japs Continue Far East Bombings

Great Britain and France speeded up security measures in Europe and the Far East today on the eve of the 25th anniversary of the World War.

With military preparations of every big power approaching a maximum in August the World War started in the first week of August 1914—both London and Paris concentrated on completing their security front by bringing Soviet Russia into a three-power political and military alliance intended to offset the threat of a new war. Developments included:

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain announced in the house of commons that a British-French military mission would leave probably this week for Moscow to consult on mutual defense and to acknowledge the determination of the two powers to carry through their proposals by sending high military and naval figures to the Soviet capital.

Agitation against Americans as well as Britons flared over wider areas in the Far East as Tokyo police guarded the embassies of both powers during a big demonstration denouncing "Britain, America, and Russia" as "our common enemy."

Japanese bombed American hospitals, missions, and schools in two Chinese cities, and poured explosives into Chinese sectors near the mouth of the Pearl river in what appeared to be an attempt to isolate Hong Kong and thus cut off the big artery of British trade with Canton. American buildings were bombed at Kioshan and Wuchow.

At the same time, many sources in London were discussing the possibility of breakdown in the Japanese-British negotiations at Tokyo for settlement of the Tientsin incident and, if the Japanese plans prevail, for smoothing out controversy on China in general.

The British government denied it had agreed to withdraw support of the Chinese currency, which Japan desires.

Japan, having claimed an initial victory in the Tientsin negotiations, has sought to use them as a lever to force Britain to cooperate with the Japanese program in China.

Behind the facade of diplomatic maneuvering on both continents, the powers pressed steadily ahead with preparations for any eventuality in August or September.

Britain's 12,000 naval reservists reported today to man 130 reserve ships put into action while the big home fleet steamed northward for August maneuvers in a position that would be taken to block German sea lanes in event of war. Aerial and land forces also will maneuver this month.

In Paris, Naval Minister Cesareo Capinichi announced France was building a fleet of 750,000 tons. Most important, he said, the French government will build up to 100 submarines to offset the German-Italian underwater fleet.

At the same time, the danger that peace talk at present would weaken the security front by new "appeasement" fears made it certain that such plans will be held in abeyance until at least after September, when Adolf Hitler addresses the Nazi congress at Nuremberg and when many diplomats believe, the test of war or peace this year will come.

Danzig Charges Polish Boycott

DANZIG (U.P.)—The government of Danzig formally charged Poland with attempting to boycott the free city's exports today and threatened reprisal.

In a note delivered to the Polish commissioner, the government alleged the Poles were boycotting Danzig fat products and herring, usually exported to Poland. The note protested a notice by the Polish government, effective Aug. 1, withdrawing customs permits from the Danzig firm of Annada Unida, manufacturers of fats and fish products.

The note said that such action made it impossible for the firm to export to Poland and violated the trade pact of 1937. The Danzig senate will take counter-measures if necessary, the note said.

Kidnaped Pastors Leave for Greece

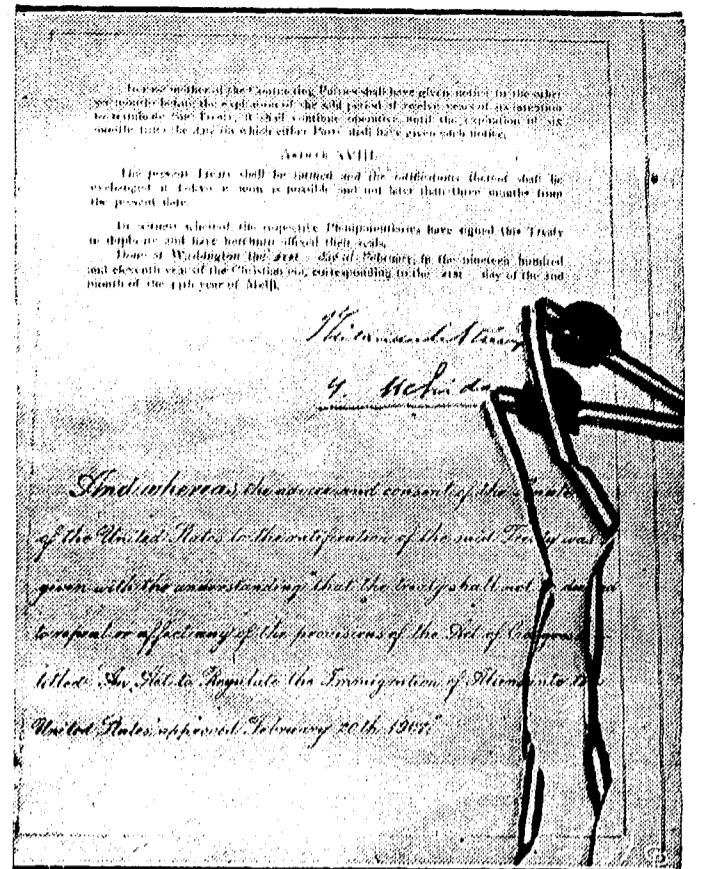

The Goldners were kidnaped by Arab bandits. The elder Goldner was released shortly and wanted their capture so that he could arrange for ransom, but the son was held for seven days.

Speaks on Martin Niemöller Swam Asserts Christ, Not Race, Sets Standard

Against the morality" what serves the nation is right, the church maintains that Christ, not race, is the standard," asserted the Rev. Alfred W. Swain in a sermon Sunday on Martin Niemöller, imprisoned German pastor and World War submarine commander, at the First Congregational church. The sermon was the last in a series on "Founders of the Living Edifice of Religion."

Pointing out that Niemöller was a member of the Nazi party from 1924 to 1933 and is an intensely patriotic German but that he could not agree with Hitler's religious and anti-Semitic programs, Dr. Swain said:

"Against the doctrine of original human nobility Christianity asserts the need of forgiveness in Christ. No human system or contemporary personality can redeem man."

Since he is a devout Christian as well as a patriot, Niemöller believes the church alone has the right to rule itself, that baptism signifies eternal life in God, thereby destroying racial lines, and that the Old Testament is organic with the Bible, declared Dr. Swain.

Dr. Will Mayo Rests Beside Charley; Rites Close Clinic

ROCHESTER, Minn. (U.P.)—Dr. William Mayo, famed surgeon, was buried Sunday beside the grave of his brother, Dr. Charles H. Mayo, with whom he founded the Mayo clinic.

Thousands joined with members of the clinic staff in the final rites for "Doctor Will," who died Friday at the age of 78 after a long illness. A steady stream of mourners filed by his bier in the Mayo Foundation house.

During the ceremonies the huge bronze doors of the main clinic building were closed—the third time in the history of the clinic. They were closed once for the death of Dr. William Mayo, father of the brothers, and the second time on May 26 when "Dr. Charley" died.

Dr. C. M. Mayo, "Doctor Charley's" son, now is the only physician on the clinic staff bearing the Mayo name.

Roosevelt Has 'Open Face'

BURGOS, Spain (U.P.)—Gen. Francisco Franco is the most difficult leader in Europe to cast in clay, Giandomenico De Marchis, Italian sculptor who has modeled Mussolini, King Zog and others, said today.

"There is a sweetness and softness in his expression which is most difficult to catch while at the same time portraying his strength and firmness of character," the artist said on presenting two bronze busts of the Spanish dictator to Franco.

Marchis plans to go to the United States in October to model President Roosevelt, who, he says, "should be easy because he has such an open face."
