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# Hank Exposes Fallacy of Decline in Home Run Hitting—It's Just Spread Out

NEW YORK (U.P.)—The fallacy that there's been a decline in home run hitting in the American league was exposed Tuesday by Hank Greenberg, Detroit's clouter, who fell just two shy of Babe Ruth's record of 60 last year.

"Check the records and you'll see that there's plenty of home run hitting this year," said Greenberg before Tuesday's Tiger-Yankee game. "It's spread out over more men, that's all."

The records show that on Aug. 1 last season, there were 462 homers and before Tuesday's games, this year's total was 476.

"That simple difference is more than accounted for by the fact that Lou Gehrig was forced out of the game and Joe DiMaggio was laid up more than a month," said Greenberg. "If those two had been playing regularly the 1938 total would be above last year's."

"Yeah, but how does that account for the fact that at the end of July last year you had 37 homers and today you have only 19?" we asked.

"I'm foolish that's why," said Hank. "I've always thought I could better my record every year and I started out this season to improve on last year. That's wrong. I had a great year last season, getting 58 homers and driving in 146 runs. When you can top that you are doing something."

Greenberg said that the ball certainly isn't any denser this year and that there has been no appreciable improvement in the pitching.

"There's plenty of home run hitting going on," said Greenberg. "I'm just not monopolizing it this year. Jimmy Foxx has 25, and Selkirk and this kid Ted Williams at Boston are getting their share of homers. Say, when you hit 40 homers you are doing all right. That Williams, I guess, consistently hits about the longest ball in the American league."

July turned out to be a jinx month for Greenberg this year. "I don't think I hit more than three homers last month," said Hank. "Last year I hit either 15 or 16 for my best month. I tapered off after that and hit 14 in August and 12 in September. Don't worry about anybody breaking that Ruth record."

During this conversation in the Detroit dugout, some stranger in civilian clothes had wandered onto the bench having a \$10 bill and telling Greenberg how he was going to bet it against an usher's \$20 that Hank would hit a homer today. The story got around that the stranger was the old time Yankee pitcher, Jack Chesbro. The stranger didn't deny that he was Chesbro, though it was learned later that Chesbro has been dead for several years.

"All right, I'll swing for you," Greenberg kept telling the mysterious stranger.

The conversation and interruptions lasted so long Greenberg didn't have time to go to the Tigers' locker room and change his sweat shirt. It was the first time since he's been in baseball Greenberg hasn't changed his wet sweat shirt for a dry one before the game.

Then with two men on in the first inning, and Red Ruffing on the mound, Greenberg went to bat and smacked his 20th homer—a healthy 40-foot clout—into the 20th row of the left field stands. That was the ball game, the Tigers winning, 5-2.

When Dean walked off the field Tuesday complaining of "that same old hurt in my shoulder" after pitching only three innings against Philadelphia, it looked like Dizzy's last stand.

He hadn't complained of soreness until Tuesday.

"Felt like my arm was about broke off," he said. "Guess now, though, I got enough left to try again."

### Millers, Blues 'Tied' for Lead
