Hecox Describes Screams And Moans Of Dying **Passengers**

Summons Doctors, Nurses. Then Leads Rescue Crew Back To Scene

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In the following article, veteran engineer E. F. Necox. a driver of a six-horse stage in his youth, describes the wreck by substeurs of his pride, the City of San Francisco the latest in luxurious, streamlined trains in the west.)

to International News Service) ELKO, NEV, Aug. 14-(1NS)-I felt the rails give a moment after passing over some green tumble weeds that I believed had been blown onto the tracks. I was running the City of San Francisco at 60 miles an hour, a restricted speed for the Humboldt river

The engine, first part of the three-unit power cars, didn't overturn because of its heavy undercarriage. It came to a stop a few hundred feet beyond the spot where I had seen the tumble weeds. The power units behind the

engine left the rails and dragged the rest of the train after it. As the engine stopped in the pitch dark, I jumped out of my cah

and ran back. All I could hear was the screams and moans of the injured and the



WASHINGTON, Aug. 14

AP)-While the Panama Canal

bserves its twenty-fifth anniversary tomorrow, the United States is hastening both the reinforcement and expansion of the vital link between the Atlantic and Pa-Preliminary work will start


