Born in Scotland, the son of the late General William Graham Niven and the late Lady Comyn-Platt, he was schooled for an army career at Stowe and Sandhurst and obtained his commission in the Highland Light Infantry. After two and a half years of service in Malta, Niven was stationed at Dover. He found army life attractive but restraining; he wanted to see the world, so he resigned his commission and sailed for Canada. Work as a lumberjack in the Canadian forests was followed by ventures in New York, Atlantic City, Bermuda and Cuba. Eventually he came to Hollywood where, as a gag, he accepted Samuel Gold-
