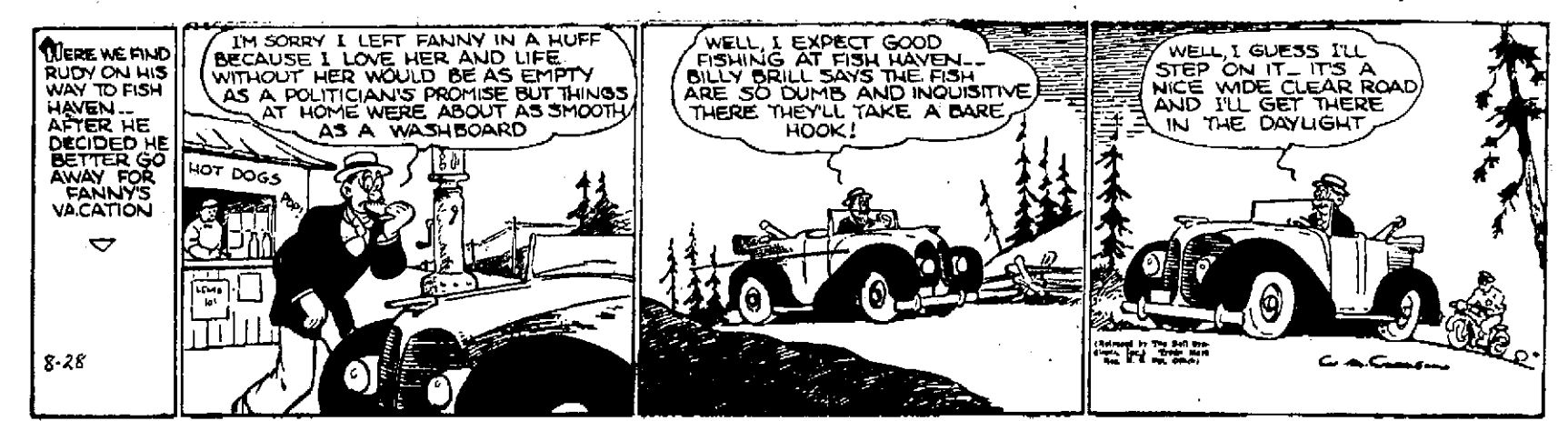

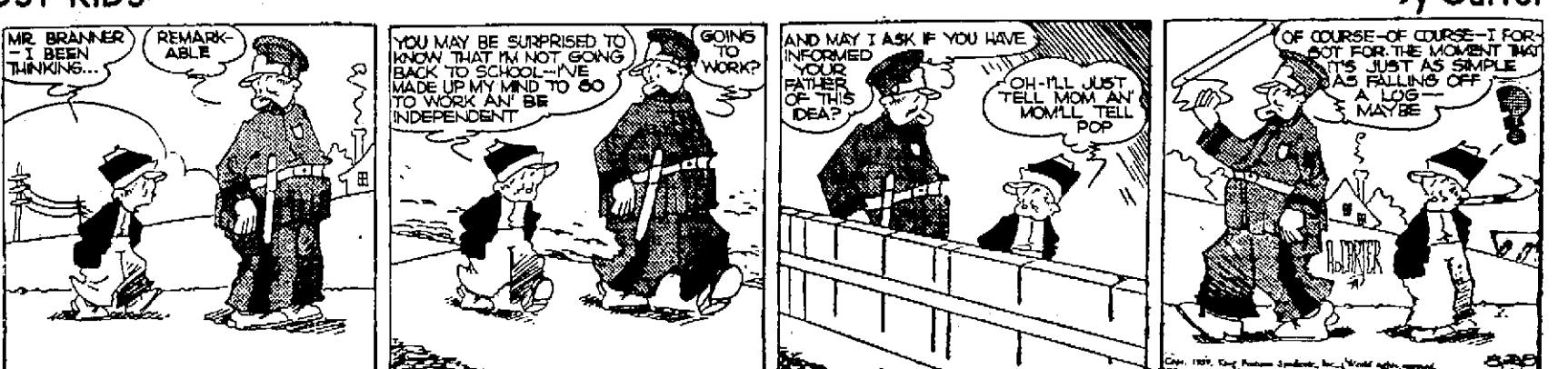

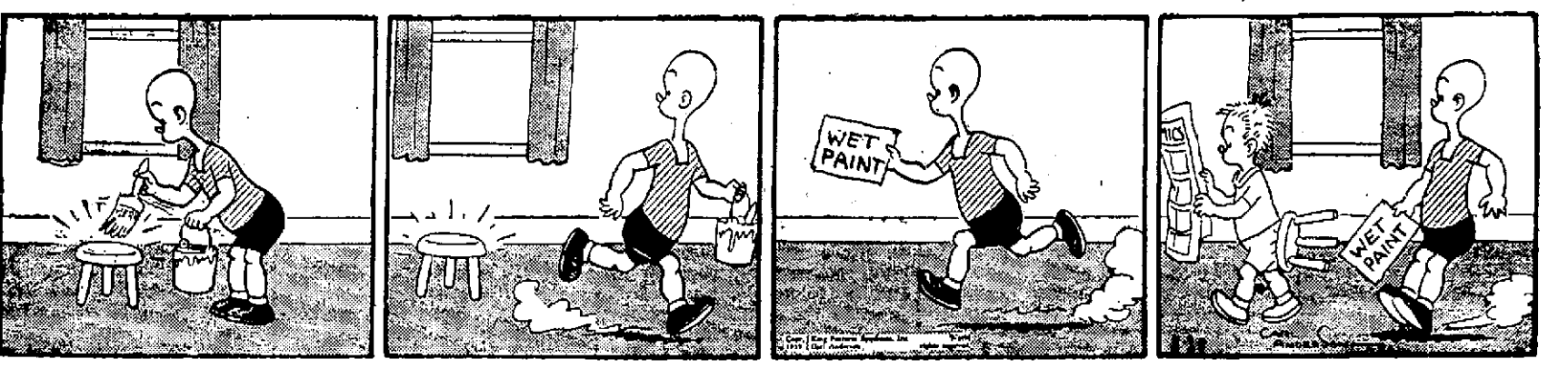

Sweden Has Remains of Stone Age Life
This week I am going to tell some things about Sweden, one of the very fine countries of Europe.
We cannot say Sweden is a small country, since it covers 173,000 square miles, and is 11 times as large as Switzerland. There is more area in Sweden than in Great Britain, Ireland and Holland together.
If we think of population, however, Sweden ranks far below Great Britain. There are more people in London than in all of Sweden. Yet Sweden has 6,300,000 inhabitants.
Sweden is a long country, and we can gain some idea of its length by thinking of how far it would stretch if laid down on this continent. With the northern end at Toronto, the southern end would reach Jacksonville, Florida!
The northern part of Sweden beyond the Arctic Circle. That section contained thousands of Lapps and Finns, but not a great number of Swedes. It has long been all through the "night" at one season, and darkness all through the "day" at another season.
In Stockholm, the capital city, June days have as much as 15 and a half hours of sunshine, and as little as eight and a half hours of twilight and darkness.
Since Sweden is a northern country, we might expect it to be a cold place, but more than half of it is blessed with a fairly mild climate. This is due to warm winds which blow from the Gulf stream even in winter. In January, the average temperature at Stockholm is only five degrees below freezing point.
Scientists say that people have lived in Sweden for about 10,000 years. In a number of places, remains of Stone Age life have been found. Among these are pictures of animals and people which were carved on rock probably 4,000 years ago.
A thousand years ago, the warlike Vikings had power over many parts of Europe. We are apt to think of them as being men from Norway and Denmark, but there were Swedish Vikings as well. The Swedish Vikings sailed and rowed to the coast lands around the Baltic sea. They won control over an important part of what is now known as Russia. The name "Russia" grew out of "Rous," a Finnish name for the Vikings.
The olden Vikings used an alphabet made up of letters called "runes." It seems likely that the course of trade. A number of slabs of stones with writings in runes have been found in Sweden and elsewhere.
