False Oath Lands Vet in Court MONROE—Because he swore falsely that he was a citizen when he obtained his 1938-'39 hunting license, John Amacher, 54, of Clarno township, Green county, was fined \$500 and costs Friday by County Judge Marshall Peterson on a charge of false swearing. Judge Peterson immediately remitted the fine, on recommendation of Dist. Atty. Rudolph Regez, Amacher is to pay court costs. The court held the case will be an object lesson and said there were mitigating circumstances. Amacher, who fought in the United States army during the World war, had applied for his first citizenship papers. According to Roger Stephens, clerk of the circuit court here, he would not have had to wait three years, usual period between getting the first and second papers, because of his war service. City Attacks Charter St. Hazard

The claim that the Charter st. crossing of the Milwaukee road is hazardous to human life and the demand that the company be ordered to hire a watchman to guard the crossing, was heard Friday before a public service commission examiner, as representatives of the city and railroad officials argued the adequacy of present safety facilities.

Doris Lehner, assistant city attorney, told Examiner Clarence V. Olson the city has been concerned for some time over the safety of drivers approaching the crossing, and has made a thorough study of the alleged hazards involved, coming to the conclusion a watchman is necessary.

Her contention was upheld by Elmer Waldvogel, an assistant city engineer, who presented a plan of the crossing and testified to poor visibility conditions, and Capt. H. J. Morris of the Madison traffic bureau, who said a watchman would be a more efficient safeguard than the present automatic signal.

Representing the railroad were Roger Trump, Milwaukee attorney; J. F. McConahay, Wisconsin superintendent of signals and telegraph for the Milwaukee road; L. B. Porter, district superintendent of signals and telegraph, and J. A. Macdonald, Madison, traffic superintendent.

Porter, who is the road's expert on safety signals, maintained the automatic signals are more dependable than a watchman, pointing to the fact that on two other Madison crossings more dangerous than the Charter st. intersection the signals have operated satisfactorily.

MONROE—The Green county Historical society will present a program Sunday honoring the founder of Green county's first cheese factory, at the site of the factory. Nick Gerber built the factory in the 1860's, according to records here. The site is the Alvin Ott farm, near New Glarus. The program will start at 2 p. m., with Dr. John Schindler, president of the society, presiding. A tablet will be unveiled in honor of Gerber, and a boulder will be dedicated to commemorate the site of the factory. Speakers will be J. C. Steinman, Monticello, one of the county's oldest cheesemakers, and Emery Odell, Monroe.

Risser Passes County Book Dispute Buck Madison's Progressive Sen. Fred Risser, who found himself on the "hot spot" of deciding the fate of a bill to settle the ancient courthouse dispute over custody of county books of account, was busy Friday trying to find how to get off the "hot spot."

Just before the senate adjourned Friday, Risser found the answer when he won unanimous senate consent to take the bill from the judiciary committee and refer it to the calendar. By such action the bill will come before the senate without recommendation. Fellow members of the senate judiciary committee put the Madison senator on the spot when they decided to let him decide whether the bill should be recommended for passage or defeat.

Sen. Risser, who knows all about courthouse feuds, spent a nervous morning trying to figure a way out of deciding the fate of a bill which in effect would decide the winner of the battle between County Clerk Austin Johnson and County Auditor John Williams over custody of county books.

BARCLAY ON BRIDGE By Shepard Barclay

THE BEST IS THE WORST ALL OF THE good books on bridge tell us that certain leads are desirable and certain ones are undesirable. Most of them are based on combinations of honor cards. Solid combinations, such as ace-kings, king-queens and queen-jacks, usually are rated as offering good lead possibilities, whereas single guarded honors or combinations of non-touching honors, such as ace-queens and king-jacks, are rated as not affording effective leads, because they stand to be more valuable if led toward than if led from. There are times, however, when the bidding reveals facts which can make the usual worst possible lead into the best, and vice versa.
