Cumberland City Utility Order Upheld

Court action instituted to vacate a state public service commission order authorizing construction of a municipal electric plant in the city of Cumberland was blocked in a ruling on demurrer handed down Monday in Dane county circuit court by Judge Henry P. Hughes of Oshkosh.

Hughes sustained a demurrer brought by the commission and the city to a complaint filed by the Wisconsin Hydro Electric Co. and W. T. Doar, a Cumberland taxpayer. The utility, until April 1, 1938, has supplied electricity to the city under contract for 15 years.

City and commission demurred to the utility's appeal from a public service commission order of Dec. 23, 1938, on the grounds that neither of the plaintiffs had capacity to bring action, and secondly, that the complaint did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action.

To the utility's contention in its complaint that issuance of a permit to construct the municipal plant was taking its property without due process of law, Hughes replied it "was not taking property in any sense of the term."

He also ruled the complaint failed to show the commission's order to construct affected the corporation's legal rights. Doar's complaint that construction of the municipal plant will mean additional cost and tax burden was refuted by Hughes, who stated he found no facts to show there might be a deficit through municipal operation.

Oscar Brachman, Milwaukee, Dies

MILWAUKEE.—(U.P.)—Oscar Brachman, 52, prominent Milwaukee realtor, died Monday after an illness of 16 weeks. He was given a blood transfusion Aug. 11 by L. B. von Spach, Milwaukee.

Guesses among Capital bigshots as to how long it will take to drag us into the war range all the way up from six months to forever. Off the record, well-informed ones predict, without enthusiasm, that it lasts until the spring of 1941. We'll plunge into it then, like a barrel going over Niagara Falls.

By that time, they say, so much metal will be flying through the air, and water that a neutral nation will have to pinch itself twice a day to remember it's neutral.

Some Republican leaders think it won't make much difference who's president in 1941—American emotions will develop the same way.

There is a wan hope, even among internationalists highly sympathetic to France and England, that we can keep out the way Spain and Holland did in the last war. How did they do it? Perhaps it was an intense desire not to get hurt. We might send a mission overseas to find out.

Miller Wins Release from Holdup Count
