

Chains Reach Agreement On Broadcasting Of War News

Rules Will End "Horror And Suspense," Says Association Head; "Valley Forge" To Be Given Wednesday

The three major radio chains have reached an agreement on the handling of war news, Neville Miller, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, announced Wednesday.

Provisions of the agreement include: 1. Efforts to avoid "horror, suspense and undue excitement."

2. Broadcasters will try to be "temperate, responsible and mature in selecting the manner in which they make the facts of war and its attendant circumstances known to the public."

3. All war news broadcasts should state whether the news is censored.

4. As far as possible, broadcasts from Europe should be made by Americans.

5. News broadcasts will remain in strict control of the broadcaster, regardless of whether they are sponsored or unsponsored.

"Valley Forge," Maxwell Anderson's famous historical play, starring its original Broadway lead, Philip Merivale, in the role of George Washington, will be the first dramatic offering on the Star theatre when the program returns to the air Wednesday at 8 p. m. over WABC.

One of a series of famous plays belonging to the Playwrights' Co., "Valley Forge" is unusual in that it will be enacted by an all-male cast featuring many of the original Broadway supporting players as well as the original lead.

The dramatic half hour of the 60-minute show will originate in New York, with the less formal end coming from Hollywood, where Emcee Ken Murray, Songstress Frances Langford and Tenor Kenny Baker will provide humor and song. David Broekman's orchestra will be heard.

Jane Froman, scintillating songstress, and William Guggenheim, 70-year-old retired copper miner and philanthropist, will collaborate on an expansion of Mr. Guggenheim's hobby of song-writing Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. over WJZ.

Another feature of the Hobby Lobby program will be the return of Dave Elman as conductor. Elman has been on a seven-week vacation which was prolonged by an appendectomy.

LYRIC One of the most unusual "props" ever shown in a picture is presented in "Panama Patrol," the Grand National feature opening Wednesday at the Lyric theatre.

It is a deciphering machine, the only one of its kind in existence, and was invented and perfected by R. W. Doidge, an executive in Grand National's home office in New York.

When producer-director Charles Lamont gave property man Rea Hunt a list which included a deciphering machine, and Hunt had exhausted all of the usual sources of material without finding one, Hunt was about ready to admit himself beat.

Turning to a club of amateur cipher fans in his search for the machine, he learned that a cipher fan named Doidge, in New York City, had developed a mechanical method of speed decoding. In contacting Doidge to arrange a loan of the machine, he was to receive the welcome air express package, and learn that it came from a man employed by his own company.
