Dane county circuit court's "streamlined" September term will open Monday with the calling of the calendar.

To speed up the term and bring only contested criminal cases to trial, defendants and their counsel will appear before Judge A. C. Hoppmann this week to enter pleas, Asst. Dist. Atty. Henry H. Behnke said Saturday.

The same procedure will be used in an effort to ease the civil calendar. Judge Alvin C. Reis will preside over cases to be tried without jury.

With only 22 criminal cases listed, among them trial of William M. Dionne, former secretary of the public service commission charged with malfeasance, the court faces one of the lightest criminal calendars in recent years.

There also are 135 civil actions to be tried by jury and 88 without jury, a total of 245 cases.
