Housing conditions in these two wards were found at the top of the list in many respects. The proportion of dwelling units in single family residences is the highest in the city; owner occupants are more numerous than anywhere else and building in recent years has been more active than in other districts.

#### Average Value \$8,100

In the 13th ward 3,110 people occupy 840 dwelling units of which 517 are owned by occupants and 609 are single family residences. The average value of an owneroccupied residence is \$8,100, while the average rent of single family nomes (including the rental value of the owner-occupied structures) is about \$60. The average rent for other types of dwelling units is about \$45.

In the 20th ward 3,696 people occupy 948 dwelling units of which 895 are single family residences and 723 are occupied by owners. 


