

Pulitzer Prize Play To Be Broadcast Monday Evening

"You Can't Take It With You" To Feature All-Star Cast; Holtz And Reardon Set With Templeton

"You Can't Take It With You," a Pulitzer prize winning play and a smash hit movie is presented for the first time as a full-hour drama in the Radio Theatre on Monday.

This sprightly comedy of a carelessly happy-go-lucky American family was written by George Kaufman and Moss Hart and was translated to the screen medium by one of the top Hollywood directors, Frank Capra.

"You Can't Take It With You" centers in the quaint household of Grandpa Vanderhof, who will be played by Walter Connolly, veteran character actor of stage and screen.

Lou Holtz, comedian, and Casper Reardon, swing harpist, will guest star on the Alec Templeton Time broadcast over WEAF Monday, at 9:30 p. m., Holtz, marking his second appearance on the second broadcast of the new series, will bring his famed character, Sam Lapidus, to spin more of his hilarious yarns and engage the British piano parodist in a cross-banter.

Reardon will demonstrate his versatility on the harp. Sherlock Holmes, that supreme unraveler of baffling crimes, returns to radio over WJZ starting Monday, from 8:00 to 8:30 p. m.

The famed Baker Street sleuth will be portrayed by Basil Rathbone, motion picture and stage star, who recently completed a celluloid impression of the Conan Doyle character in Hollywood.

Co-featured with Rathbone will be Nigel Bruce, another popular movie figure, who will enact the Dr. Watson role. Sherlock Holmes will originate in Hollywood studios.

The baffling case of "The Sussex Vampire," by the master mystery writer, Sir Conan Doyle, opens the new series. Adapted for radio by Edith Meiser, the case concerns a man who suspects his wife of being a vampire.

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Many Adventures Unfolded In Double Bill At Lyric

"Port Of Hate" And "Boy Friend" Are Attractions; Ohio's "The Star Maker" Thrills Patrons

"Port of Hate," half of the Lyric bill, is a story of two partners who locate a pearl bed on a tropical island. The adventures that befall them makes an exciting picture.

"Boy Friend," with Jane Withers, also is showing. All who saw "The Star Maker" at the Ohio over the week-end were highly pleased with the performance given by Bing Crosby, Linda Ware, Louise Campbell and Ned Sparks.

Continuing to thrill Sigma patrons is "Blackmail," with Edward G. Robinson, Bobs Watson and Ruth Hussey. It is a story of a man who flees a prison camp, attempts to lead a straight life, but is recognized by an enemy and is forced to return to his old life.

Four more days remain for the showing of "The Rains Came," at the Quilna theatre. Myrna Loy, George Brent and Tyrone Power have the leads in this picture, which shows a group of people fighting the forces of nature.

"Big Town Czar," half of the State bill, is a story of a gangster who runs a big city. It shows the "czar" played by Barton MacLane fighting his brother who is trying to take over the rackets.

The heaviest downpour on record in Hollywood's movie history fell during the filming of Darryl F. Zanuck's production of "The Rains Came," Louis Bromfield's sensational successful novel, which 20th Century-Fox is currently presenting at the Quilna theatre, with Myrna Loy, Tyrone Power and George Brent sharing stellar honors.

It was estimated that 10,000 gallons of water fell each shooting minute, approximating 40 inches of rainfall each day—more than most parts of the United States have in a year.

Since the Los Angeles rains did not carry enough water, the studio built a reservoir holding 100,000 gallons.

The rain fell in great torrents for 47 days out of a shooting schedule of three months. Experts predicted 17 types of rainfall to match those of India, the locale of the story.

And rain was not the only catastrophe the stars had to face, for the picture also faithfully reproduces the flood, the dam break that adds to its havoc and wrecks the mythical city of Rancipur, the earthquake and the fire, which highlight Bromfield's story.

The stars took plenty of punishment during the filming of these catastrophes, which Director Clarence Brown predicts will be more breath-taking than any of the great screen spectacles of the past.

Despite every precaution, almost every important member of the cast was forced out of the picture for a few days at one time or another due to colds contracted or injuries sustained.

"The Rains Came" features a great supporting cast, including Brenda Joyce, star-maker Zerkow.
