## Absent Witness Wins Freedom for Mrs. La Bruzzo

Absence of Martin Ossen, 39 key state witness, meant dismissal from two state liquor law violation charges for Mrs. Anna La-Bruzzo, 708 Milton st., in circuit court Monday.

Mrs. LaBruzzo appeared for jury trial before Judge A. C. Hoppmann on charges of selling liquor without license, and of possession and sale of untaxed liquor. Walter M. Bjork, assistant dis-

trict attorney, informed Hoppmann that neither police nor sheriff's officers had been able to locate Oasen, since the case was set last Wednesday. Bjork then asked testimony of the LaBruzzo preliminary hearing be used at Monday's trial, or failing that, dismissal for Mrs. LaBruzzo. Hoppmann chose the latter course. Mrs. LaBruzzo was arrested


