## Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



**TREE SWALLOW**

The Tree Swallow is a handsome bird, steel-blue above and pure white below.

It is a common summer bird in Wisconsin, nesting throughout the state but less numerous in prairie areas. Its nesting area runs from Canada to southern California, Colorado, Kansas, northeast Arkansas and Virginia.

It winters from central California, southern Texas, the coast regions of the Gulf states and North Carolina south to Honduras and Cuba.

About 20 per cent of its food is vegetable, chiefly berries and a small quantity of seeds. Flies are its favorite food but it also eats weevils, ants, wasps, wild bees, plant lice, tree-hoppers, chinch bugs, moths, dragonflies, etc.

After the nesting season, late in July or early August, old and young gather in large flocks flying in wide circles over fields and lakes or resting in long rows on telegraph wires or in dead tree tops.

## Grade A Milkmen Organize

Through the Central Grade A Cooperative, an organization incorporated at Wausau Oct. 10 by representatives of seven large Wisconsin dairy cooperatives, producers shipping milk to Chicago and not affiliated with the Pure Milk Assn. will have a voice in matters pertaining to any federal or state marketing agreement.

This objective, according to the state department of agriculture, is outlined in the new co-operative's incorporation papers, which were signed by the Consolidated Badger cooperative, Shawano; Antigo Milk Products cooperative, Antigo; Barron Cooperative Creamery Co., Barron; Pure Milk Products cooperative, Madison; Columbus Milk Products cooperative, Astico; West De Pere Cooperative creamery, and the Fox River Valley Creamery Co., West De Pere.

The Central Grade A Cooperative will provide a medium through which some 5,000 Wisconsin shippers of Grade A milk to Chicago may be represented at hearings relating to changes in Chicago's federal milk marketing order. It will also furnish its members with a market information service.

Directors and officers of the new cooperative will be elected at a meeting to be held at Wausau today. Permanent headquarters for the group also will be chosen.

SPARTANBURG, S. C.—(UP)—Love's labor was not lost when Miss Evelyn Huntstinger and Lloyd Rogers decided to get married. The license office was closed and the clerk of the judge of probate court was at a baseball game. Such a mixture is known to be lacking in riboflavin, a member of the vitamin B family which is needed for growth. Riboflavin is a substance commonly met with on the farm since it is the pigment which gives whey its characteristic greenish color. Grass, leafy hay, yeast, and animal by-products are likely to be good sources, while cereals cereal by-products, and seeds are generally lacking in it.

In dry-lot feeding experiments, Phillips has been able to confirm what has often been noted on farms—that feeding just a straight grain ration doesn't give the best results in raising hogs. And he has been able to ferret out one of the things responsible. Pigs fed on the check ration did make fairly good gain, but when supplement feeds high in the substance, riboflavin, were added, the pigs made better gains—in some cases as much as 10 to 15 per cent better.

Phillips points out that trouble from a riboflavin deficiency is likely to be found only in dry-lot feeding. Hogs on pasture are less likely to be affected because there they are getting green feed.

He suggests that in dry-lot feeding, if pigs have access to certain supplement feeds, they will make better growth. He lists as possibilities skim-milk, whey, tankage, or leafy and bright colored hay, particularly alfalfa. Cereals like corn, barley, linseed meal, and wheat middlings, while always valuable as hog feeds, he indicated, are likely to be deficient in this riboflavin factor.
