

Gene Autry And Fred Allen Set For Two-Gun Interview

Dead-Pan Comedian Priming Himself To Shoot It Out With "Buck" Benny; Al Pearce Has New Singing Group

Gene Autry, famous cowboy film hero, will face the two-gun wit of Funnyman Fred Allen in a six shooter interview during the hour broadcast over WEAH Wednesday at 9 p. m.

Allen has heard that his arch rival, Jack Benny, is making a horse opera to be entitled "Buck Benny Rides Again."

After shooting it out with Autry, the funster will turn from riding the range to tracking down murderers by playing his favorite microphone role, One Long Pan, Chinese detective.

They are Jean Arthur, James Stewart and Edward Arnold, the first two co-starred in the romantic leads, and Arnold as part of a truly distinguished supporting cast which includes such stellar names as Thomas Mitchell, Claude Rains, Guy Kibbee, Ruth Donnelly, Eugene Palette, Brulah Bondi and Astrid Allwyn, to name only a few. Sidney Buchman, one of Hollywood's best known scenarists, wrote the screenplay of "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington."

What makes a stage show good? Theatrical men, when they gather at their club, in a theatre office or a booking agency, always turn to the discussion of shows. Literally, they "take shows apart to see what makes them tick."

When all the arguing is over and the clouds have rolled away it is usually agreed that the "talent" in a show makes it tick. Whether the argument is about some of the great Ziegfeld productions of the past, or the better companies on tour today, "talent" usually wins all arguments.
