The Eastern Crow is the member of its family common in Wisconsin. It nests from Canada to Maryland, the northern part of the Gulf states and northern Texas. It migrates south in winter from the more northerly part of its

range. -It is an abundant summer resident of Wisconsin, nesting throughout the state and is present in diminished numbers in winter in the southern part and less frequent at that time farther north.

The Crow is smaller than the Rayen. The end of its tail nearly square and it lacks the Raven's long, pointed fea-tures on the throat and breast. Its caw distinguishes it from the Raven's croak. After the nesting season is

over all crows of a considerable area assemble nightly to roost in a chosen bit of woodland.

Wisconsin's crow popula-

tion has increased, chiefly it is believed, because of the wholesale killing of its enemies, hawks and owls.

The crow is injurious because of its raid on farmers' fields to eat corn and other grains and because of its habit of eating fruits, garden crops, eggs and nestlings of wild birds, eggs and young

poultry.
On the other hand it is beneficial in eating insects such as May beetles and grubs, weevils, grasshoppers, cutworms, caterpillars, spi-ders, crawfish, rodents, and carrion of all kinds.
