

Choral Director, Violinist To Be Guests Of Templeton

William Miller And Leonard Sorkin To Sing And Play; Tommy Riggs And Betty Lou Will Give Halloween Party

Virtuosi within his own ranks will be featured by Alec Templeton when he introduces William Miller, choral director, and Leonard Sorkin, violinist, as soloists on the broadcast Monday at 9:30 p. m., over WEAF.

Miller will sing "Ah Moon of My Delight" from Lehmann's "In a Persian Garden." Sorkin, concertmaster of the string orchestra featured on the program, will be heard in "Let Me Dream On," a Templeton composition based on a Glazounov violin concerto.

Alec will inject the Halloween spirit with his originalopus, "Ghost" Rhapsody, and "Ding Dong, the Witch is Dead."

Tommy Riggs and Betty Lou will give a Halloween party for their guest artists. Roy Atwell and Rosemary Calvin, during their weekly broadcast Monday at 8:00 p. m. over WEAF.

Atwell, a scrambled word slinger long before the expression "double-talk" was coined, has been in show business 40 years. Miss Calvin is the audition winner from Detroit in Riggs' new "give-the-unknown-a-break" series. Riggs will sing "Jealous" and Freddie Rich's band will give out with a college medley honoring Wisconsin, Southern California and Yale.

The tense drama of a mother whose own daughter didn't know her identity is the theme of the Lux Radio theatre's version of "The Old Maid" which co-stars Loretta Young and Miriam Hopkins on Monday, Cecil B. DeMille is the producer of the dramatic hour that's heard over WABC at 9 p. m.

It will be up to Loretta Young and Miriam Hopkins to accomplish their "aging" through the use of voice alone which is a difficult acting task. Miss Hopkins plays the same role she had this season in the smash-hit motion-picture version of "The Old Maid."

"The Adventure of the Devil's Foot," described by Dr. Watson as one of the most gruesome experiences he and Holmes ever encountered, will engross Sherlock Holmes and his chronicler when the mystery is presented over WJZ Monday at 8 p. m.

On the bleak Cornish coast, final stronghold of devil worship in England, Holmes and Watson had away for a vacation in the spring of 1897. But murder shattered the peace of their hideaway and Sherlock Holmes found himself confronted with a crime having every indication of supernatural origin. Unique atmosphere music arranged by orchestra leader Lou Kozloff will emphasize the terror that struck the Tregennis family until Holmes applied his deductive powers to solve the problem.

"Tune-Up Time's" Monday broadcast from Hollywood at 8 p. m. over WABC will include one novelty number in the Halloween month entitled "Peter, Peter, Pumpkin Eater." The piece is an unpublished composition by Andre Kostelanetz, music-maestro of the Monday evening series, and will be performed by the 45-piece "Tune-Up Time" orchestra. Another significant orchestral number will be Debussy's "Clair de Lune," a classic tone poem, long a Kostelanetz favorite.

"The Spirit Flower," one of the best-known songs by Louis Campbell-Tipton, will be sung by Margaret Speaks, soprano, on the Wallenstein Hour program Monday, at 8:30 p. m., over WEAF. Miss Speaks also will be heard in Wood's "I Heard You Go By," Herbert's "Kiss Me Again" and Strauss' "Voices of Spring." Alfred Wallenstein will conduct orchestra in Elgar's "Pomp and Circumstance" march, the Largo.

GERMAN PEOPLE READY FOR ANYTHING, EXPECT LONG AND HARD PULL

BERLIN, Oct. 30.—(AP)—The end of the first two months of war finds the German people stolidly ready for anything. They expect a long, hard pull. All would welcome peace but few any longer believe there is hope of an early end to the war.

They, so far, are putting up with more inconveniences than actual hardship and there is a certain amount of grumbling and criticism, some of it surprisingly in the open.

But Nazi propaganda has met considerable response. Distrust of England is not what it was at the beginning of the world war. But more and more Germans are resenting England's "interference" in central European affairs and many have come to feel that if the Reich loses this war the new peace terms will make the Versailles treaty read like a bedtime lullaby.

That, in brief, is the broad impression given a neutral observer after two months of the strangest war of modern times.

Three leading Hollywood stars — Clark Gable, Jeannette MacDonald and Spencer Tracy — enact brilliant roles in "San Francisco," a story of that city's daring and romantic days, which opens Tuesday at the Lyric theatre.

The other new picture on the Lyric screen will be "Special Inspector." Ending Monday are "Susannah of the Mounties," a thrilling tale of the north woods, and "I Am a Criminal."

Making up the great double bill at the State are "Million Dollar Legs," starring Betty Grable and Larry Crabbe, and "Andy Hardy Gets Spring Fever." The first picture shows Gable and Jeannette on the campus while the other features Andy Hardy, portrayed by Mickey Rooney, in love with his school teacher.

Others in the cast are Lewis Stone, Cecilia Parker and Fay Holden.

Flaming youth, speakings, returning doughboys, the Charleston, waltz wars, souping stocks and rising stars all will be seen in "The Roaring Twenties," current Ohio attraction. This film, based on a story by Mark Hellinger, co-stars James Cagney and Priscilla Lane. Many other big stars of Hollywood are in this picture.

The amusing drama of a big-city doctor plus the true-life story of how gangsters are born are seen in "The Escape," half of the Quilna bill.

Completing the bill is "Heaven With a Barbed Wire Fence," the story of youths roaming the road with no hopes and no dreams. Dean Rogers and Raymond Walburn share acting honors.

Showing at the Sigma is the uncensored version of "All Quiet on the Western Front," a Hollywood film which has restored to the picture many scenes originally deleted and added new scenes, and costily mounted to bring up to date the greatest screen document of the war, and its effect upon human lives, ever filmed.

Two great features, "Rose Marie" and "Code of the Streets," are current at the Lyric.

"On Borrowed Time," a fantasy beautifully handled by Paul Osborn, who has not made a single slip on either the whimsical or sentimental side, in dramatizing Lawrence Sanders' novel, will be presented at the Ohio theatre on Wednesday by the Legitimate Theatre Corporation of America.

The picture opens in New York, atop the Empire State building. There Glenn Ford refuses to be a guard that he's leaving the city, which he heartily dislikes, after having saved just enough money to buy a mail ranch in Arizona known euphemistically as "Shady Acres." He proceeds to hitch-hike to his "heaven" and on the way encounters Jean Rogers, a Spanish refugee enroute to join an aunt somewhere in California; Nicholas Conte, a boy with "itching feet"; and Raymond Walburn, an elegant hobo who was once a noted professor. The story takes us into the perils that befall youth on the road. What happens to them when they finally reach Arizona, how Glenn and Jean are married to save her from the immigration authorities and how they react to a "Shady Acres" that turns out to be a wasteland makes an absorbing film of "Heaven With a Barbed Wire Fence."

OHIO WESLEYAN HEAD TO SPEAK AT LIMA MEET

Ohio Wesleyan-Alumni-assen dinner will be held at the Trinity church Tuesday evening. Dr. Herbert J. Burgstahler, president of Ohio Wesleyan university, will be guest speaker.

Dr. Burgstahler, a native of Buffalo Lake, Minn., graduated from the University of Minnesota, and received a degree from Boston university's School of Theology in 1915. He later preached several years in Rochester and Buffalo, N. Y., Minneapolis and St. Paul. He went to Cornell college, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, in 1927. Cornell was reportedly in bad financial condition. When the depression came he had already begun to build up the school's finances and its academic rating and continued building during the depression. Cornell college was in the best condition in its history, financially and academically when Dr. Burgstahler left last year to accept a position at Ohio Wesleyan.

Dr. Burgstahler is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Delta Sigma Rho, the Republican party, Masonic Order and the Rotary club.
