Richest Poet In World, Originator Of Jazz And A Modern Jonah Included On List Of Heatter's Guests

The richest poet in the world, the originator of jazz, and a modern Jonah who went underwater with a whale, are included among the guests who will tell their experiences on Gabriel Heatter's "We, The People" Tuesday at 9:00 p. m., over WABC.

One of the few outstanding poets to be a great financial success is Edgar Guest, who will tell Gabriel Heatter an astounding story of his rise to fame.

The originator of jazz who will be heard on the program is "Jelly Roll" Morton, composer of the "Dark Town Strutters Ball." He claims to have played jazz as early as 1902 in New Orleans.

Arthur B. Cotnoir, one-time harpist for the whaling schooner "Valley" out of New Bedford, Mass., will tell how in 1912 when harpooning a whale he fell out of his boat and on to the whale's back. He became enmeshed in the line and when the whale submerged he died.

The famous Paul Taylor choir, graduates of Bing Crosby's program, will be heard on the weekly Fibber McGee and Molly broadcast Tuesday at 9:30 p. m. over WFAF.

This in "On Borrowed Time" the magic of stagecraft again solved a tough technical problem and produced a realistic effect, more convincing than actuality.
