William Gifford Bale, internationally known character actor, will present his own version of the famous classic, "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," at 7:45 p. m. Tuesday in Central High auditorium.

His appearance is the third in a series of seven numbers scheduled on the Central High Lyceum course.

Bale enacts all the characters with the aid of special lighting effects and scenery and a unique collection of costumes designed for quick changes.

Bale not only holds his audience spell-bound thruout the program, but he leaves a definite lesson in character-building and also creates much interest as to the art of make-up and impersonation.
