Marlene, Una Merkle Swap Heated Blows

Gals Muss Each Other Up For Art's Sake In New Saga Of Western Plains

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 4-(UP)-Latest Hollywood paradox is presented by Marlene Dietrich, the golden-haired blonde with the lovely legs, who has traded in her glamour roles for a knock-down dragout fist fight.

The spectacle of Miss Dietrich squaring away against Una Merkel, their teeth bared, their faces contorted and their arms flailing, was the sight-of-theweek recently in Hollywood, and it was almost exciting enough to supplant war news.

Veteran observers said the fight, three days of filming and accomplished not without some bruised shoulders and skinned elbows, is an all-time high in feminine fisti-

Miss Dietrich waited a year and a half for a screen role different from the glamour characters she has been portraying, and it's doubtful if she could do a better job in this direction. She plays a hair-pulling entertainer in a frontier soloon, a regular vixen, in "Destry Rides Again" for Universal, and it was for this that she and Miss Merkel enacted their historic con-

The fight started with both principals reaching for the opponent's throat and hair, rolling from a table top to the floor, scuffling back and forth like two angry blonde bears, and finally being interrupted by lanky James Stewart, who pours a bucket of water on them. From that point Marlene transfers her wrath to Stewart. tossing at him everything from violins to six-guns.

Miss Dietrich was fired with an unwonted spirit, and after the first scene the embattled Miss Merkel reported that she had to fight with all her strength just to

protect herself.
"It wasn't acting." Miss Merkel sighed.

It was Miss Dietrich, however, who got the elbow and shoulder bruises, and a splinter in her right foot. Faces of both the fighters were grimy from the dust of the floor. Miss Dietrich washed her face at lunch time, and so that she could resume the scene afterward. she rolled on the floor and picked up a fresh supply of dust.

And if it isn't paradox to see Marlene Dietrich thus situated, Marlene herself doesn't know the meaning of the word.




