"For All Of Our Lives" Will Star Ida Lupino And Herbert Marshall Over WEAF At 8 P. M. Wednesday

Romance packing a wallop wends its way to the microphone on Wednesday evening, when the Hollywood Playhouse presents a radio adaptation of Ursula Parrott's popular novel, "For All Of Our Lives," over WEAF at 8 p. m.

Lovely Ida Lupino, who recently scored a hit in the motion picture, "The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes," will guest star opposite Herbert Marshall.

"For All Of Our Lives" is the stirring story of a talented young actress to whom overnight come love and fame. But heartbreak hovers in the wings of Gillian Dwight's triumphant march to fortune is accomplished thru a veil of tears.

Herbert Marshall falls heir to the part of Derek Warner, maine idol, who plays his greatest role offstage. Here is a story radio audiences will carry with them long after the microphone has ceased to resound with the last dramatic echo.

Adventure And Comedy Will Be Found In Sigma's Films

"Bad Lands" And New "Nancy Drew" Hit Are Showing; Lyric Offers Warner Baxter As "The Cisco Kid"

Grim adventure and stirring drama are presented in "Bad Lands," half of the new bill at the Sigma theatre. Robert Barrat, Douglas Walton and Robert Coote head the cast of the picture, which deals with the fate of an Arizona posse trapped by vengeful Indians on the desert.

The other picture, "Nancy Drew and the Hidden Staircase," finds Bonita Granville finding trouble in a haunted house. In this film she is supported by Frankie Thomas and John Litel.

The fightingest, loveliest cabalero of them all comes back to the Lyric theatre on Thursday in "The Return of the Cisco Kid," starring Warner Baxter. The laughing, singing, "bulletproof" bandit, whom jails can't hold, meets his most exciting adventures—and the most beautiful senoritas—in this film. "For Love or Money" will also be on the new bill.

Closing Wednesday at the Lyric are "Three Smart Girls Grow Up" with Deanna Durbin, and "Death Goes North."

In "Thunder Afloat," current Ohio theatre attraction, Wallace Beery portrays a man who tried to fight the World War single-handed. In this film he is court-martialed, stripped of his uniform, but he is still a hero.

Supporting Beery in this story of the men who put to sea in ships and of the women who bravely await them, are Chester Morris and Virginia Grey.

"Lady of the Tropics," with lovely Hedy Lamarr and Robert Taylor, starts Thursday at the State theatre along with "Heritage of the Desert," a Zane Grey novel.

Ending Wednesday at the State are "Musie," a rollicking comedy romance picture starring Ann Sothern and Robert Young, and "The Man in the Iron Mask." In the latter film Jean Bennett and Louis Hayward have the leading roles.

"Hollywood Cavalcade," one of the greatest technical films of the year and now current at the Quilna theatre, stars Alice Faye and Don Ameche.

This picture, having a cast of thousands, first shows Miss Faye as a small time actress and

costly delays to move, this newest production innovation for filming scenes on boats was developed by Ralph Shugart, sound technician on "Thunder Afloat," at the Ohio theatre.

An agile member of the studio sound department was equipped with special gloves and an insulating vest. He was then handed a ball-type microphone to hold in his hands while dialogue was being recorded in difficult corners of subchambers used in the picture. As actors Wallace Beery, Chester Morris and Virginia Grey moved about on deck, the human microphone carrying his own cables, climbed over rigging and ladders, after them all. When they stopped in pilot house or below decks, the human mike asked his arms thru windows and post holes to follow dialogue without a break in continuity.

Other unusual recordings on the picture include actual sounds in a submarine during a battle, with the "whoosh" of torpedoes leaving tubes, submerging apparatus in action and the sound of depth bombs exploding under the surface.

Thrilling action sequences, showing battles between a sub-chaser fleet and a submarine, the torpedoing of a fishing ship and final torpedoing of a sub by depth bombs, were shot off the Atlantic coast with the World War days, and off the Coronado Islands on the west coast.

"Nancy Drew and the Hidden Staircase," the fourth in the series of pictures based on the widely read Carolyn Keane stories, comes to the Sigma theatre with Bonita Granville again in the role of the indomitable girl detective. The other leading parts are filled by the same players whom the wide public which follows this series has come to expect to see in their familiar roles. These include Frankie Thomas as Nancy's boy friend and companion in adventure, John Litel as her father, and Frank Orth as Captain Tweedy. Other leading parts in the new picture are played by Renee Rima, Vera Lewis, Louise Carter, William Gould and George Guhl.

As the title of the new picture indicates, it has a somewhat more eerie atmosphere than the previously filmed adventures of the girl detective.

The climactic sequence of the picture—and it is both exciting and terrifying—comes when the villain traps Nancy and her boy friend in the underground tunnel. He enters with the intention of killing them both but they succeed in knocking him unconscious first.

Then they find, however, that they can't get out because the doors at either end of the tunnel are fastened with spring locks. Ted gets the idea of breaking a water pipe to sluice a hole thru the roof of the tunnel. Apparently the only difference that makes us to indicate that their fate will be drowning instead of suffocation, for the water starts using lost in the tunnel. Meanwhile Nancy's father has informed Captain Tweedy of her disappearance and the police get to the scene just as the youngsters have finally succeeded in breaking a hole thru the top of the tunnel.
