Frick Supports Six-Day Week for Big Leagues

PHILADELPHIA.—(U.P.)—Pres. Ford Frick of the National Baseball league today supported a six-day week schedule with double-headers on Sundays and an open date on Monday to eliminate "synthetic twin-bills."

"I'd much rather have the double-headers played on the regular schedule than let the teams call off a game at the last minute to create synthetic twin bills," Frick said Friday at a private showing of the senior league's second motion picture, "Play Ball, America."

"I'm for it," Frick said of the six-day plan.

Frick also forecast that all 16 major league teams would be playing night baseball at their home grounds within five years.

Lights are here to stay," he said. "It may be a year or two off my guess but I feel that all the big league clubs will be playing under their own lights by 1944."

He denied rumors that the National league was considering moving the St. Louis franchise to another city.

"There's nothing to it as far as we are concerned," he said. "It's the American league problem in St. Louis—not ours."

Frick disclosed that National league teams played to 350,000 more customers last year than in the previous season and that all the clubs, except possibly the Phillies, made a profit.

Schommer Calls on Alumni to Aid Chicago Football

CHICAGO.—(U.P.)—University of Chicago alumni Friday studied a threat that unless they helped the school obtain better football material they may see their alma mater virtually eliminated from Big Ten competition.

John Schommer, former Chicago football star and now a Big Ten sports official, told an alumni meeting Thursday that it was up to them to help keep Chicago on athletic schedules of other conference schools.

"Unless something definite is done, Chicago is going to find it increasingly difficult to schedule conference games because its opponents are reluctant to accept small revenue which comes from playing in a stadium almost empty," Schommer said.

Jay Berzinger, former Maroon player and now freshman coach at the school, told the alumni it was their job to find athletes who can qualify for scholarships if they are unable to pay their own way through school.

Conn, Lesnevich Train Together

NEW YORK.—(U.P.)—Fight fans were treated to a new training stunt Friday when light heavyweight champion Billy Conn and Challenger Gus Lesnevich worked out simultaneously in two rings at the pioneer gymnasium in preparation for their title fight at Madison Square garden next Friday night.

The double workout followed formal signing of contracts at the boxing commission, posting of \$2,500 forfeits, and physical examinations by Dr. William H. Walker.

Nazis to Cancel Olympic Games

BERLIN.—(U.P.)—The German Olympic committee soon will notify the international Olympic organization that it will be impossible to hold the 1940 Olympic winter games in Germany because of the war, it was reported unofficially Friday.

The main or summer Olympic games still are slated for Helsinki, Finland.

The winter games were scheduled for Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany, where they were held in '36. Germany's inability to hold the winter games will necessitate their transfer to some other country, if they are to be held at all.

State Umpires Get Wider Jurisdiction

WICHITA, Kan.—(U.P.)—Pres. Raymond Dumont of the National Semi-pro Baseball Congress announced Friday that the Wisconsin Empire assn. of Milwaukee has been granted a charter giving it state-wide jurisdiction over certification of all sand lot umpires.

Acting president of the Umpires' assn. is Stanley J. Yurgates.

The 1940 Wisconsin semi-pro baseball tournament has not been assigned. Last year it was held at Antigo.

ENGLISH SPARROW

Although an alien, the English Sparrow is the bird that everybody knows because it has become so common, intruding every place where people live.

The original home of the English Sparrow was throughout Europe and the British Isles, except Italy, east to Siberia. It was established in this country by many importations from 1850 on in more than a hundred cities.

When clean, the spring male has a clear black throat, dark gray crown, chestnut on nape and wings, with a white patch below the eye and a white wing bar. It is duller in the fall and winter. The female lacks the black throat and gray cap and is generally duller.

Bird students say it does comparatively little good and does considerable damage. It drives away native birds of much greater value.

Its food consists of grain, berries, fruit, garden vegetables and it eats few insects and of these a large proportion is made up of useful species.

The nest is built about the eaves and in drain pipes of buildings, in bird boxes, among vines on buildings and trees and in almost any place. The nest is of grasses, straw, rags, string, paper, etc.

The sparrow is extremely hardy and survives the Wisconsin winters without finding it necessary to migrate to a warmer climate.
