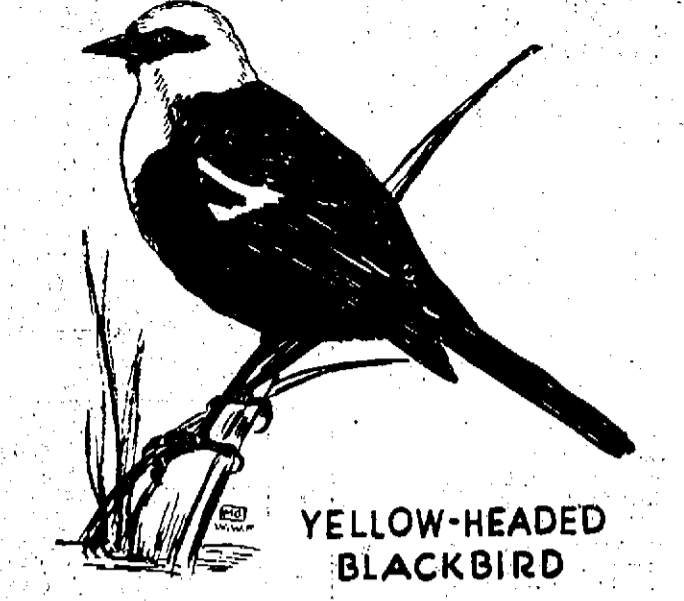

Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



YELLOW-HEADED BLACKBIRD

The Yellow-headed Blackbird, like the Red-wing, has a bad reputation for its raids on farmers' fields.

It is a common summer resident of Wisconsin, nesting in all suitable locations in the state. It has invaded forest regions where extensive reed-grown marshes exist.

Its nesting range is from southern Canada south to northern Mexico and east to Wisconsin and Indiana. It winters in southwestern United States east to southern Louisiana and in Lower California.

The nest is over water in marshes and sloughs. It is a deep, compact structure built of the blades and stems of reeds and other grasses woven like a basket and attached to the stems of quill-

reeds. It also may be among bullrushes. Its food consists of injurious insects including grasshoppers, white grubs, aquatic larvae, leeches, wood ticks and grubs.

This bird walks or runs when on the ground. The adult male is unmistakable with his bright yellow head and breast. Elsewhere it is black except for a large white patch on the wing. The female is much smaller than the male, a generally brown bird with pale yellow or yellow and white throat and chest and white spotted or streaked breast. It has no white on the wing.

Red Cross Drive Ahead of '38 Mark

This year's Red Cross roll call returns are far ahead of those at this date last year, Mrs. Lohra S. Davies, executive secretary, reported to a meeting of the Dane county Red Cross executive committee at noon today.

Reports at the close of business Monday listed 630 members; 307 from Mt. Horeb and 225 from Shorewood Hills where intensive campaigns were carried on last week at the outset of the membership drive, and 98 from Madison where the campaign is slower in getting under way.
