178 FAMILIES OBTAIN RELIEF IN HARDIN-CO

(Lima News Bureau) KENTON, Nov. 15 — A total of 178 families, consisting of 712 persons, in addition to 38 single persons were included on the relief rolls of Hardin-co during September, it was revealed in a report released today by E. W. Sweeney, state relief examiner from the office of State Auditor Joseph T. Ferguson.

The total cost of relief in the county was set at \$3,954.02 for the month, Sweeney's report states.

On direct relief were 26 families of 104 members for which \$322.10 was spent. For 28 single persons \$315.45 was expended, the report shows.

Under work relief were 152 families of 608 persons and in that classification \$2,162.83 was spent. Single persons on work relief numbered 10 for which \$93.15 was expended. The total of that expenditure amounted to \$2,839.53.

Administrative expenditures were \$128.35 and WPA project sponsorship out of the county relief fund was \$311.7. Other encumbrances amounted to \$897.97 for a total of \$3,954.02.

Double Bill At The Sigma Offers Fans Comedy, Drama

"Two Bright Boys" And "Night Work" Are Attractions; Heifetz Featured In New Hit On The Ohio Screen

"Two Bright Boys," a crashing drama of the fight for oil, starring Jackie Cooper, Freddie Bartholomew and Alan Dinehart, is now current at the Sigma theatre. Completing the bill is "Night Work," the story of the "Fitches," without a doubt one of the funniest, most human and most lovable screen families in America.

"They Shall Have Music," current Ohio attraction, is the story of the touching romance of a youth and a girl whose happiness is bound up with the hopes and dreams of a hundred poor kids.

Clarence Sletz, manager of the State theatre, announced Wednesday that Western Union and Postal Telegraph messenger boys will be admitted free to see "Call a Messenger," half of the bill. Starting in this picture are Billy Halop, Hantz Hall and "The Little Tough Guys," "Bachelor Mother," also on the bill, features Ginger Rogers and David Niven.

Opening Thursday at the Lyric are "The Texas Wildcatters," depicting the thrills of western cowboys attempting to capture a phantom outlaw, and "Youth Takes a Flung," starring Joel McCrea and Andrea Leeds.

"Smuggled Cargo," and "In-Idle Story," telling the thrills of New York City reporters, will show Wednesday.

"Beware Spooks," current Quilna attraction, is Joe E. Brown's funniest picture and Mary Carlisle, his leading lady, has distinguished herself as a comedian. Brown, cast as a patrolman, is fired from his job when he allows a gangster to escape thru his dumbness, but he eventually gets his job back and a vacation as well.

Second picture is "U-Boat 29," a timely and authentic drama of submarine warfare and international espionage.

QUILNA Lovely blonde, Mary Carlisle, it has been said, sky-rocketed to stardom. The familiar Hollywood phrase is, fortunately, a decidedly inaccurate one. Sky-rocketed they come in a blaze of glory, but they come right down again. Mary Carlisle has spent the past six years going up and she's still going up.

The young lady, currently featured at the Quilna theatre as Joe E. Brown's leading lady in "Beware Spooks," began her flight to fame when she was given a screen test while lunching in a Hollywood commissary. The screen test won her a chance to dance in pictures, but her histrionic ability was more than adequate. As a result, Miss Carlisle was given an ingenue comedienne role in "Montana Moon," appeared in "Night Court" and "College Humor," and a long list of other films.

To date, she is officially accredited with some 35 screen roles. At one time in her career, she appeared in 15 pictures in 12 months, which obviously kept her busy. She enacted all sorts of roles, also she was not asked to dance.

Among the pictures in which she has played leading roles are "Saturday's Millions," "East of Fifth Avenue," "This Side of Heaven," "Handy Andy," "Superspeed," "Double Or Nothing," "Hold 'Em Navy" and "Dr. Rhythm."

SIGMA "Night Work," a new comedy about the "Fitches," that lovable, funny family which America has taken to its heart, is at the Sigma theatre. Co-starring Mary Boland and Charlie Ruggles as the heads of the "Fitch" menage, and Donald O'Connor as "Butch," one of their adopted sons, the picture shapes up as even better screen fare than "Boy Trouble," the following comedy in which the

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"Fitches" were introduced to the public. Trouble starts when Donald O'Connor runs away because he doesn't like his school work, and isn't quite certain that the family wants him. They persuade him to remain by assuring him that his grandfather will arrive shortly to certify that he can be legally adopted.

The old gentleman makes his appearance that night. A rugged old fellow, a stoic by trade, he is skeptical of Charlie's ability to bring up the boy properly. Mary and Charlie do their best to show the old gentleman that they are the sort of people Donald should have for parents, but all their efforts go for naught when one of Charlie's childhood friends rents an apartment in the building which Charlie is managing. He invites the family to dinner, and proceeds to point out that Charlie was known as "Wishy Washy" in his youth!

Donald's grandfather is about to take the boy away with him when Charlie, in a funny climactic scene proves that he really is a courageous parent.

Excellent in supporting roles are Billy Lee as the other adopted son, "Joe," Joyce Matthews, as the daughter who is very much in love, and John Hartley, as Miss Mathews' boy friend. William Frawley delivers one of his best comic portrayals in a small role. "Two Bright Boys," completes the bill.
