# 600-800 One Room Schools to Close

### 31 in Dane County Expected to Shut Doors

Little red schoolhouses, 600 to 800 of them scattered over the state, will be closed next fall and consolidated with other rural schools, the department of public instruction said today.

About 31 will be shut down in Dane county, department officials expected. Eighteen of these are in Dane's western district, 13 in the eastern district.

There are some 1,234 one-room sural schools in the state with enrolments of 12 pupils or less, department figures showed. Enrolment of 12 pupils means an average daily attendance of not more than 10. At this point a new law that came into effect Sept. 1, too late to

> 0 0.0 Under the old law, a school even if it had only one pupil, received \$250 from the state annually and \$250 from the county. In addition, if the assessed school district valuation was low and warranted further help, it was entitled to \$350 equalization aid.

> The new law provides that a school with an average daily attendance of 10 or less, if it continues to operate, is paid \$25 state and \$25 county aid for each pupil on an attendance basis. No equalization aid is provided.

> If the school closes and pupils are sent to another school, however, the district with the closed school will be paid \$25 state and \$25 county aid for each pupil, computed on the basis of attendance, plus a \$100 bonus, and \$18 transportation aid for each pupil. 0 0 0

PEORIA, III. — (U.R) — Fred Brenckman, Washington, representative of the National Grange. said today attempts by the United States state department to rush ratification of a pending recipro-cal trade agreement with Argentina appeared to be an effort to buy that nation's friendship at the cost of the American farmer.

"It is perfectly clear there is no sound economic reason for reducing tariffs on products coming into this country from the Argentine," Brenckman reported to the 73rd annual grange meeting. There is a diplomatic or political reason. Argentina has been traditionally unfriendly to the attitude of this country it is the guardian of the western hemisphere under the Monroe doctrine."


