# Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



### ROSE-BREADED GROSBEAK

The Rose-breasted Grosbeak is a black and white bird with a brilliant, rose-red, triangular patch on the breast. The wings are lined with a delicate rose-red. The bill is short, thick and light-colored. The female is very different, a dull, brownish bird, striped below, resembling a large sparrow. A broad white line over the eye and two white wing bars and a wing lined with orange yellow are other characteristics. The young fall male resembles the adult female but has a pinkish wash on the breast and the linings of the wings are pink. The wing bars are buffy. The first year breeding male usually has the black of the throat more or less interrupted with white and the black of the back is not perfectly developed.

The Rose-breasted Grosbeak builds its nest in trees and bushes, four to five feet up. It is loosely and openly built of small twigs, weed stalks and rootlets, with no special lining.

This is another of the birds that can be found in a variety of dress. The adult male in spring is a black and white bird with a brilliant, rose-red, triangular patch on the breast. The wings are lined with a delicate rose-red. The bill is short, thick and light-colored. The female is very different, a dull, brownish bird, striped below, resembling a large sparrow. # 75 Sign Amended UW 'War Scroll'

The Youth Committee Against War has obtained approximately 75 University of Wisconsin signatures for its scroll avowing a refusal to support the United States government if it should enter the present European war, according to Robert Rumsey, chairman of the group, speaking at a meeting Tuesday night at the Y. M. C. A.

A footnote has been added to the scroll, stating, "This obviously does not refer to war fought on United States soil." Rumsey explained that numerous questions made it necessary to add this footnote.

He announced that Norman Thomas, national socialist leader, will speak to a student group Dec. 11, when he is in Madison to make an address in favor of peace. His talk will be sponsored by the Y. C. A. W., who will ask him to speak on the conscription issue.

Concerning the scrolls which the organization is circulating, Rumsey said that scrolls will soon be placed in all student centers and "we expect to make the university students conscious of the need to fight against war."

# Grant County Board Approves Salary Boost

LANCASTER—The Grant county board went on record Monday in favor of an increase in County Agent W. C. Voskuil's salary from \$2,000 to \$2,500 and to retain the county nurse and welfare worker.

A committee was named to investigate feasibility of replacing the old home for the poor with a new building. The board allowed sheriff's claims and salaries of \$8,147, \$711 less than in the past year, and \$2,000 for the highway patrol.

# Grange Demands Reciprocal Trade Pact Termination

PEORIA, Ill. (U.P.)—The National Grange, representing farmers in 36 states, today demanded termination of United States reciprocal agreements to separate free trade from politics.

Resolutions adopted at the 73rd annual meeting proposed establishment of a non-partisan board representing both producing and consuming interests to replace the trade treaties negotiated by the state department. The producer-consumer board would have authority to regulate and promote "advantageous exchange of goods."

# Cold Winds Greet 'Last' Guardsmen

SPARTA—Leadens overcast skies and cold raw winds Monday greeted soldiers of the 105th cavalry, the 105th medical regiment, and the 105th quartermaster regiment as the third contingent of Wisconsin national guardsmen took over from the infantry doughboys at Camp McCoy.

The pleasant Indian summer days which prevailed during the preceding two weeks disappeared Monday and had the civilian soldiers moving fast and hard in their drill routines to keep warm. The troops are housed in heated, ventilated, and electrically lighted barracks.

Cavalry troops took the field in spectacular scouting drills as Brigadier Gen. Ralph M. Immell, commanding officer of the 53rd cavalry brigade ordered practical rather than theoretical training for the week. Medics will establish and operate their base and field hospitals. Quartermasters will get practice marches over rugged Camp McCoy terrain to prepare them for the time when they may have to get important supplies to troops under wartime conditions.

Approximately 1,000 troops of the national guard are in this, the final contingent to undergo the special week of cold weather training. In addition, about 400 officers and men of the 3rd field artillery, regular army troops are at Camp McCoy getting in additional winter training.
