

Shaw's "Pygmalion" Will Be Radio Theatre Feature

"Star Dust" Composer To Guestar With Alec Templeton; Cole Porter's Latest Musical To Be Aired

George Bernard Shaw, famed Irish playwright, rarely allows radio presentations of his plays but the Radio Theatre, gained permission to produce "Pygmalion" on Monday, Nov. 27, with Brian Aherne and Jean Arthur in the lead roles.

Cecil B. DeMille will supervise the broadcast over WABC 9 a. m. with Brian Aherne as the phonetic expert, Professor Henry Higgins. Jean Arthur is cast in the exciting role of Eliza Doolittle, Cockney flower-girl. Eliza's speech is polished out by the finicky Professor Higgins just to prove his friend Colonel Pickering that she can be passed off as a beauty within an allotted period of time.

Carmichael will sing one of his early successes, "Washboard Blues," which will be heard in imitations, and his Lan-O-Malley in answer of his Lan-O-Malley monologue. The chorus is directed by Liam Miller and the orchestra Daniel Saldenberg.

The first broadcast of the complete score of Cole Porter's new musical, "Du Barry Was a Lady," will be featured by Andre Kostelanetz and his soloists on "Tune-Time" Monday at 8 p. m. over ABC, as the highlight of an all-Porter program.

Tony Martin, Kay Thompson and entire cast of "Tune-Up Time" will be heard in the new songs which are titled "Katie Jo Hatti," "I Love You?" and "It Was I in The Stars." Singing star-of-ceremonies Tony Martin and the ensemble will open the broadcast with "Blow, Gabriel" from "Anything Goes."

The Bach-Gounod "Ave Maria" will be Richard Crooks' feature on Monday at 8:30 p. m. over WJZ. Crooks also will sing "Kilbarney" "Hills of Iona" by Fox, and Malotte's "The Girl's Prayer" by Alfred Wallens. In addition the orchestra in the concert, Brahms' Hungarian Dance No. 5 and the Ballet music from Gounod's "Faust," Lionel Stander, tough guy of screen, and Evelyn Lynne, liostress, will be guests of myriads and Betty Lou on the gram Monday at 8 p. m., over EAP. Miss Lynne is making her first trip to New York to appear on the broadcast. A contralto, she featured soloists of the Breakers, Club Matinee program in 1930.

SECOND ANNUAL VISUAL EDUCATION PROGRAM IS STARTED IN PUTNAM-CO

OTTAWA, Nov. 27—Agreeing with the theory that "seeing is believing," officials of the Putnam school system are conducting their second annual visual education program this winter.

Through this program, all of the schools in the county receive regular showings of both educational and entertaining moving pictures. The pictures to be shown to the first circuit schools during the next period are: "The Puritans," "Purifying Water," "Sound Waves and Sources," "Bacteria," "Ohio Travelogue" and "Clouds."

Second circuit schools will see the following: "The Moon," "Persecution Group," "The Old South," "Central America," "Molecular Theory," "Digestion" and "Ohio Travelogue."

Most of the films are obtained thru the state department of education but a few reels taken by county school officials are shown during the year. Each film is left at each school two days. They are shown both in classrooms as demonstrations for classroom work and in assemblies. Some films are shown in departmental meetings of the teachers.
