# Who's Who Among Wisconsin Birds



### EASTERN SONG SPARROW

The Eastern Fox Sparrow does not nest in Wisconsin but it is an abundant spring and fall migrant throughout the state. Its nesting range is from the tree limit in northwestern Alaska across northern Canada to northern Quebec, south to northern Manitoba, Magdalen Islands and Newfoundland. It winters from the lower Ohio and Potomac Valleys to central Texas and central Florida. It is found west to North Dakota in migration and is casual elsewhere.

The Eastern Fox Sparrow is a large sparrow with bright rufous tail and rump. The back is darker than the rump and tail. Below it is heavily streaked and spotted with rufous-brown and black. The belly is white and the bird has no wing bars. It has a thick conical sparrow-bill. The food of this bird is about 86 percent vegetable. It eats seeds of bushes, trees, weeds and grass, also fruit, mostly wild, and a variety of insects.

It builds a large, well made nest on or near the ground. It is of grasses, dead leaves, moss and feathers. (Scraperhook page 107 of the second series of the educational program of the Wisconsin Wildlife federation.)

## Pro Gridders Break Every Record But One

RUTHERFORD, N. J.—(UP)—National Professional league football teams closed the record books today on the greatest offensive campaign in the history of the sport.

The professional eleven swept the statistics books clean, except for one instance, breaking 14 circuit records and tying one, final figures for 1939 showed.

Every offensive mark, with the exception of yards gained rushing, was bettered as the teams, aided by the most talented collection of rookies in years, hung up five for four passing, four ground-gaining, three scoring, and two field goal standards. One field goal mark was tied.

**Bears Best on Offense**  
Former records were bettered in some instances by two or three clubs a feat attributed in part to several rookies like Parker Hall, a rambly wizard of the Cleveland Rams; Davey O'Brien of Philadelphia, another forward passing star, and several others, including Sid Luckman, Bill Patterson, and Bob McLeod of the Chicago Bears; Dick Todd, Jim Meade, and Jim German of Washington, and John Pingle, Phil Martinovich, and Darrell Tully of Detroit.

The Chicago Bears became the greatest offensive unit in league annals when they knocked off six records—two in scoring and four in ground-gaining—by running up 298 points and 3,988 yards against 11 opponents. Green Bay, western division champions, and Washington also bettered marks in these departments, contributing to a new total league-scoring mark of 1,692 points, 298 points more than last year's total, and an average of 30 points per game.

Young Connie Schwogler won first prize of \$75.00 in the Milton Junction individual bowling sweepstakes Sunday night when he rolled a four game count of 929. His marks were 226, 191, 233 and 279. In his last game, Schwogler finished with nine straight strikes.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill.—(UP)—University of Illinois officials said Monday that Kenneth S. Wilson, university athletic director, had been given a new two-year contract.

The action followed closely dispatching to alumni of a letter signed by Don Seaton, former Illinois track coach, urging that Fred Young, Bloomington, Ill., sports editor, replace Wilson.

Reports of disension between Wilson and Coach Bob Zuppke of the Illinois football team, were denied by Wilson last week at a football banquet.

## Oregon High Plays Marshall Tonight

OREGON—Ranked as one of the "darkhorses" in the conference race, Oregon high school's basketball team opens its Madison Suburban league schedule here tonight against Marshall. Graduation wrecked last year's strong team, which tied with Johnson Creek for the league crown, won district and regional titles, and competed in the state class C tournament; it won 22 out of 24 games.

Bernard "Buddy" Martin is the only letterman Coach Charles Parr has on this year's team. This year's team is well-stocked with good ball handlers, but lack size and experience. The team defeated Brooklyn and an alumni team.
