

Allen Plans Special Show To Celebrate Anniversary

Fred Marks Seven Years With Same Sponsor; Kay Kyser Will Do Special Arrangement Of "Oh, Johnny, Oh"

To celebrate the start of his seventh year for the same sponsor, Fred Allen will take one of his earliest roles, that of Inspector Bungle McAllen, as a highlight of the show Wednesday at 9 p. m. over WEAF.

Fred will be assisted by his Mighty Allen Art Players in reenacting one of the most colorful cases in his career, "The Machine Gun Depth Bomb," or "Escape in the Mouth of a Whale." Carrying on also will be Portland Hoffa, Harry von Zell, songstress Wynne Murray, the Merry Macs, Helen Carroll, Peter Van Steeden and his orchestra. His "Person You Didn't Expect to Meet," will be Carl Johnson, who pound by pound is unquestionably the hottest trumpet player in the world. Carl is four years old and weighs 56 pounds.

Now that everybody has given "Oh, Johnny, Oh" a workout on the networks, Kay Kyser is going to lend new emphasis to the revived tune with a special arrangement on his "College of Musical Knowledge" over WEAF Wednesday at 10 p. m. His orchestra will also play "The Little Red Fox" from Kyser's picture, "El Rancho Grande" and "Beer Barrel Polka." Vocals include "Lilacs in the Rain" by Ginny Simms; "Goody Goody" and "Stop It's Wonderful" by Sully Mason; "My Prayer" by Harry Rabbitt and duet of "South of the Border" by Rabbitt and Ginny Simms. Kyser's musical quiz questions will, as usual, predominate.

Charles Boyer, soft-speaking French screen and radio star who recently returned to the United States after service with the French army, will rejoin the Hollywood Playhouse Wednesday. He is booked for a 26-week run in his regular spot as featured artist on the show heard Wednesdays at 8 p. m. over WEAF.

Boyer left this country in July to fill a contract with a French film company and was in his native land when the war broke out. He was drafted for service and only recently was mustered out after hostilities on the western front failed to attain expected proportions.

Boyer will make his first appearance on the Playhouse in a dramatization of his last movie, "When Tomorrow Comes." Gale Page, heard with Jim Ameche on the series during Boyer's absence, will play opposite the French actor.

Al Pearce, in his role of master-of-ceremonies and comedian, will present Harry Lang, noted character comic of the radio and vaudeville, when he leads his gang before WABC on Wednesday from 8 to 8:30 p. m.

Sue Carol, former motion picture star now serving as agent for other picture stars, will guest on the Hollywood end of the Star Theatre Wednesday at 9 p. m. Miss Crael will be presented in a sketch kidding agents, Ken Day, Ray, Irene, G. Cablett, Frances Langford, Kenny Baker and David Broekman's orchestra will be heard.

Cliff Arquette, versatile radio comedian probably best known for his portrayal of "Grandpappy Sneed," will replace Red Skelton as director of the Wednesday night series at 8:30 p. m. over WJW.

Since coming to radio he has played practically every type of character and spoken every kind of dialect.

Arquette has appeared on such major shows as Fibber McGee and Molly and Rudy Vallee Hour.

The remainder of the cast, which includes Edna Stillwell,

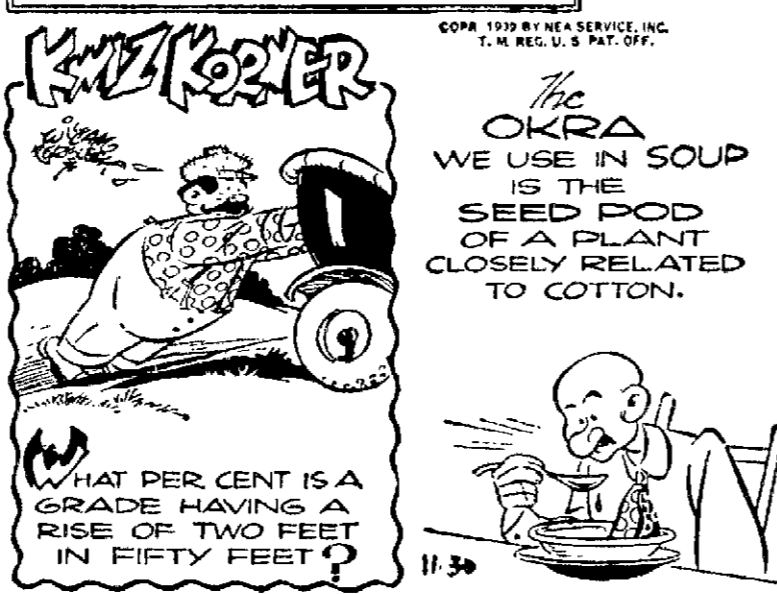

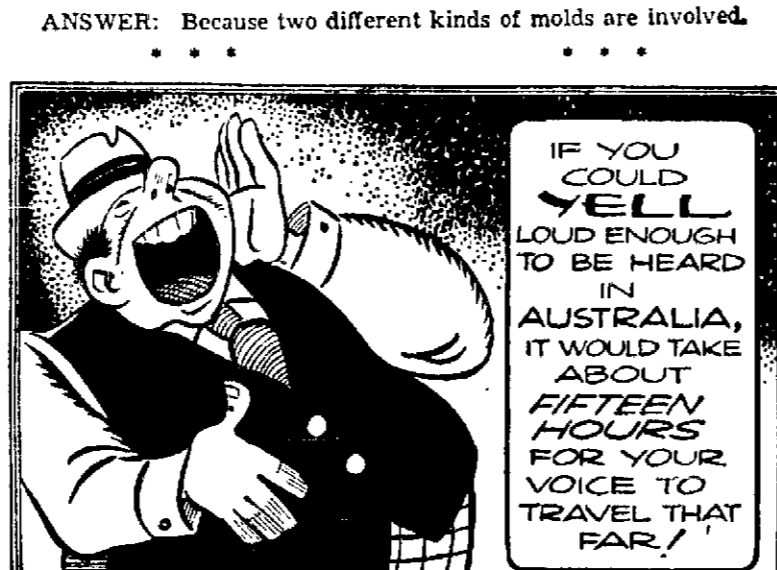

VILLAGE HEADS ARE RENAMED

Oscar Finster Elected Vice Mayor As Ottawa Council Meets

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—Election of a vice mayor, appointment of committees and the reappointment of two village officials featured the first meeting of the Ottawa council for 1934 here Tuesday night.

Oscar Finster was chosen vice mayor and president pro-tem of the council without opposition. He succeeds William Smith who remains on the council.

Henry Harrington was reappointed street commissioner for one year at a salary of \$900 per year while City Solicitor Joseph J. Labadie also was re-elected for two years. Both men were hired by resolution of the council.

The following committees were announced by Mayor J. S. Ogan, Jr., for the next two years: finance—Albert Schumaker, Smith and Finster; ordnance—Smith, Schumaker and Leitch; health—John Reimann, Finster and E. P. Falke; sidewalk—Korner, Reimann and Falke; streets and sewers—Falke, Reimann and Schumaker; and fire—Finster, Smith and Korner.

Before any business was transacted, Labadie spoke in the councilmen and the elective officers of the village. The officers, besides the mayor are Clerk Edward Doppler, Treasurer Edward Frame, and Municipal Herb Douglas.

Efforts will be made within the next couple of weeks to get some kind of an outline of what is needed in the way of a sewerage and sewage disposal system in Ottawa, councilmen decided. They felt that the survey is to be made to determine the exact cost of improving the village's sewage disposal system could be done better if council had some idea before it
