Dixon Faces Jury Trial on 3 Counts

Sam Dixon, 745 W. Washington ave., was bound over today in superior court to circuit court for jury trial on three counts of receiving stolen property.

Dixon appeared in court to face trial on one count charging him with receiving 48 pounds of stolen cheese on Nov. 18, and for preliminary hearing on two counts of receiving stolen goods from the Volla Bros. garage, Utica, Nov. 1, and the F. W. Hemminghaus tobacco warehouse, 1438 Morrison st., Dec. 20.

His attorney, Laurence W. Hall, obtained a circuit court jury trial on the first count Judge Roy H. Proctor bound Dixon over on the other two. Dixon previously had pleaded not guilty at arraignment.

Ozias C. "Bob" Hall, paroled DeForest bank robber now awaiting sentence on several charges, was placed on the stand and testified he sold cigars to Dixon. The cigars, Hall said, were part of the 37 cartons he had stolen from the Hemminghaus warehouse.

County Board Chiefs to Aid Merit Setup

Fifteen county board chairmen were named today as an advisory committee to aid the department of public welfare in setting up the civil service system for county employees engaged in public assistance work.

The committee of 15, named by Frank Klode, director of the department of public welfare, will meet in Madison with Klode and his staff and representatives of the federal social security board on Jan. 17 to discuss plans for the merit system.

Such questions as to what body should be the appointing authority in each county, what personnel should be exempt from civil service, salaries and classifications of positions will be discussed at the meeting.

Under terms of the federal social security act it is mandatory that in each county of the state, a uniform state-wide civil service plan be established to cover all employees in county pension departments. In order for Wisconsin to continue to receive federal aid for old age pensions, aid to dependent children, and blind pensions, the civil service plan must be put into effect.

Frank Stewart, chairman of the Dane county board, is one of the 15 board chairmen selected to advise with state and federal officials. Other committeemen are Foster B. Porter, Grant county; Horace Mills, Walworth; Joseph Smerchek, Racine; Lawrence J.
