Kay's Outfit On Stage At Southern; His New Picture Scheduled To Open At Sigma Saturday

The rollicking retinue of Kyser Kollege, featuring a facetious faculty and an all-round orchestra, will romp onto the stage of the Southern theatre in Columbus for the Kay Kyser broadcast Wednesday at 10 p. m. over WEAF.

The popular professor and his versatile musicians, who will be featured in the Sigma theatre hit "That's Right, You're Wrong," commencing Saturday, will offer the solos of "Ginny" Simms, Harry Babbitt and Sully Mason, with the antics of Ish Kabbibbe and the Professor interspersed.

Isabel Jewell, screen and radio actress, will play opposite Charles Boyer in the Hollywood Playhouse drama, "Enchanted Chorus Girl" on Wednesday at 8 p. m. over WEAF.

Miss Jewell will take the part of a Parisian chorus girl who falls under the hypnotic spell of an evil magician. Boyer will play the lead role of a theatrical producer.

Fred Allen, aided and abetted by the Mighty Allen Art Players, will give both romance and history a shock with a drama on the story of Queen Elizabeth and Lord Essex during his broadcast over WEAF Wednesday at 9:30 p. m.

Fine entertainment is in store for State patrons Thursday when "Dancing Co-Ed" and "Panama Lady" begin a three-day run. First picture stars Lana Turner, lovely Hollywood readhead, Ann Rutherford and Artie Shaw and his "hot" orchestra.

The second film features Lucille Ball and Allan Lane. Ending Wednesday are "Babes In Arms," with Mickey Rooney and Judy Garland, and "Two Bright Boys," featuring Jackie Cooper and Freddie Bartholomew in a story of oil.

Bing Crosby and Linda Ware, 14-year-old singing discovery, form a new model vocal team in "The Star Maker," glorious song-studded cavalcade of show business which opens Thursday at the Lyric. Also on the program will be "Mesquite Buckaroo," Wednesday will be the final day for the showing of "Coast Guard," and "News Is Made at Night."

"I have a two or three months vacation coming to me," Albert explained on the "Brother Rat and a Baby" set at Warner Bros. He is a young father in the current Ohio hit. "I intend to take it this winter. I should have right for that farmhouse I've been talking and dreaming about, and get to writing before my ambition becomes dulled."

"But I've become slightly crazy about boats and sailing. For the first time in my life, I've found a way to relax. I get out on my boat alone and nothing seems to matter. I even forget time. Last week-end I set out for Calumna last Saturday night. I was gone four days, and scarcely realized it."

Albert's present boat is a 37-foot yawl. If he decides to set sail for Tahiti, he'll buy a larger, better equipped craft, but one he can handle alone.

If he answers the call of the sea, Albert knows he'll have to postpone the start of his writing for another year or two, possibly longer. There will be picture assignments waiting for him at Warner Bros. when he returns to Hollywood, and there will be offers of plays to reluctantly refuse. He has turned down three such offers in the past six months, while he has been appearing in the movies.

WORKER KILLED IN ODD MISHAP

Cloyce R. Haughn, 40, Suffocated In Leipsic Grain Elevator

(Special To The Lima News) LEIPSIC, Jan. 17—Cloyce R. Haughn, 40, elevator employe, died of suffocation when he fell in the granary at the Prentiss elevator, north of Leipsic Tuesday.

Haughn, accompanied by Mack Sehey, a fellow employe, had climbed to the top of the 75-foot elevator to loosen oats encrusted by "swating."

Haughn walked out on the oats, which collapsed under his weight, dropping him 35 feet and covering him instantly. Employes had to work nearly two hours to recover his body.

Dr. W. C. Miller, Putnam-co coroner, pronounced a verdict of accidental death by suffocation.

The elevator is owned by N. G. Bennett, of McComb, and managed by George Moorhead.

Haughn, who spent most of his life in Putnam-co, is survived by his wife, Alice; two daughters, Eileen and Irs, at home; his sister, Mrs. Walter Kidd, of Chicago; and three brothers, Walter and Myron of Leipsic, and Arthur of Kansas, Ohio.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at the Bethel church, northwest of Leipsic, Rev. O. D. Meyers and Rev. Elman Lehman will conduct the rites and burial will be in Harmon cemetery, Gilboa.

The body will be removed Wednesday evening to the residence to remain until time of services.
