There were 125 buildings ready for burning in the village of St. Francis, and two complete forts -Wentworth and Crown Point. The latter was a replica of the one which the British actually spent \$10,000,000 to build on Lake Champlain.

Filming really started on July 6, 1939. Sets had been reconditioned, another trainload of props brought in, and camps established. The main one included 40 log cabins, two frame dormitories and a flock of circus tents. There was a separate camp for extras and a third for the 364 Indians. A fleet of power boats was brought in by rail; a river was widened and dammed, and a special hydroelectric plant installed.
