Fascists Flay U. S.

Press Assails Roosevelt For Appointing Myron C. Taylor

ROME, Jan. 27.—(UP)—Regime Fascista, newspaper owned by Roberto Farinacci, former secretary general of the Fascist party, attacked President Roosevelt, American Protestants, American Jews and America in general in an editorial today.

President Roosevelt was accused of being one of the statesmen responsible for the European war. Denouncing the President's choice of Myron C. Taylor, former head of the United States Steel Corp., as his personal representative at the Vatican, the newspaper said that Roosevelt's choice of a Quaker representative in a nation which showed a lack of desire on the President's part for his "greatly heralded" peace aims.

The editorial said the President was of Jewish descent and was surrounded by Jewish advisers. "Roosevelt, who is surrounded by a group of Jewish counselors, is as responsible for the Jewish war declared against Germany as are the Jewish governments of London and Paris," it continued.
