Mazomanie Upsets Lodi on Late Rally

Juda Keeps Undisputed Section Lead

Putting on a steaming stretch drive with Mike Linley delivering in the pinch with a quartet of free throws, Mazomanie high school's basketball team, continued its sizzling pace in the Tri-Country league race Friday night by knocking off Lodi, 26-22, and dropping it into a tie with Prairie du Sac for the lead.

The Maroons outscored the opposition, 11-4, in the fourth quarter to upset the Blue Devils, keep alive their own outside chance of winning the championship. It was the fourth straight league victory for Coach A. C. Hanneman's Mazo cagers and kept them tied with Black Earth for fourth place.

Prairie du Sac moved into the first place tie by outscoring Spring Green's defending champions, 28-22, for the latter's second straight defeat. Black Earth tripped Waukegan, 18-9, and Arena defeated Sauk City, 24-12, for its first victory of the season.

For three periods, Mazomanie and Lodi battled on even terms with the score being knotted three times, the last time at 15-all at the end of the third quarter. Russ Hodgson put Mazo out in front, 17-15, and Linley pitched in a free throw. Arby Thompson followed with a goal for Lodi.

Then Linley dropped in three straight free throws to give the Maroons a 21-17 lead and they held the four-point margin to the finish. The Maroons made 10 goals in 35 shots while Lodi connected for nine goals in 47.

Jack Lucey and Hodgson led Mazo's scoring with 10 and seven points, respectively, while Harlan Fellows and Thompson had seven and six markers for Lodi.

Prairie du Sac's strong offense took a 19-18 lead at half and withstood a fourth quarter Spring Green drive for its seventh triumph, in eight starts this season. Again it was the Blackshirts' "Big Three," Melvin Bickford, Gibbs Zauft and Lorin Schoepfhorst, who paced their attack; they had nine, eight and seven points, respectively. Junior Sorenson, Spring Green's sharpshooter and league leader, paced the scoring however, with 12 points and Harold Bonson followed with eight.

Prairie du Sac missed 10 free throws while Spring Green failed on four.

A first quarter spurge by Black Earth left Waukegan trailing, 10-2, and the latter never was able to close the gap although it battled the winners on even terms through the final three stanzas. Larry Knovles and Ed Barsness led Black Earth with seven and five tallies, respectively, while Bud Sakl accounted for seven of the nine Waukegan markers.

An airtight defense was the major factor in Arena's win over Sauk City. Coach John Schlicht's winners limited the Cardinals to two field goals and dominated play all the way. Arena held a 14-6 advantage at the half. Jack Anding was the leading scorer of the game with 12 points for Arena; Al Scholough had seven.
