# Daug's Tells of Solons' Troubles

LAKE MILLS — Assemblyman Palmer F. Daugs (D., Ft. Atkinson) outlined difficulties of a legislator to the Lake Mills chamber of commerce here Thursday night.

"There is too much temptation to give the state the cream and let the other units of government take what is left, if any," he said.

"Although the 1939 legislature did make some appropriation for relief (ruled unconstitutional by the attorney general), most of this is being spent in the northern part of the state, and it is probable that during the present biennium our county and most of the counties will receive nothing from the state to help pay for the cost of the relief program," he said.

Daug's referred to the three proposed changes in the constitution which will be voted upon if the 1941 legislature votes for them: Optional forms of county government; optional plans for the installment payment of real estate taxes; and prevention of further diversion of highway funds.

"Of the work in the legislature he said, 'frankly, it is almost impossible for any member of the legislature to be thoroughly familiar with every measure that is introduced.'"

# Travel High, Steamship Line President Says

Travel conditions in the Orient are normal, and shipping interests are doing their usual amount of business, C. G. Gardner, travel authority for American President lines who is in Madison today, said.

Gardner believes the Far East is becoming better known as a travel area, and pointed out the S. S. President Coolidge, flagship of the line, on her last round trip to the Philippines, via China and Japan, grossed more revenue for passenger and freight traffic than has any ship in the history of Pacific shipping.

"Liners are operating on regular schedule and sailing with full passenger lists," following the northern route westward "round the world via the Orient, the Red sea and the Mediterranean to New York," Gardner said, "and the hostilities in China are so far removed from the usual tourist areas that our clients are visiting north China as well as in Shanghai and Hong Kong."

# Edison Amends Reason for Squalus Disaster

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Secretary of Navy Edison revealed today the submarine Squalus disaster might have been averted had routine procedure in diving—the closing of four, hand-operated "hull stop valves"—been followed.

The naval court of inquiry which investigated the tragedy absolved of "serious blame" the officers and crew of the ill-fated submarine and attributed the sinking to mechanical failure of the air intake valve leading to the
