

Eagle Scout Will Be Guest Of Fred Allen On Wednesday

Kyser Show To Be Heard From Miami; Star Theatre To Do "Jezebel" With Miriam Hopkins And Lowe In Leads

Fred Allen will help celebrate National Boy Scout Week by interviewing Eagle Scout Edward Antonioli, described as New York's most typical Boy Scout, as his "Person You Didn't Expect To Meet" Wednesday, at 9:00 p. m., over WEAF.

Each doing his good turn in Boy Scout tradition, will be Fred's usual all-star cast consisting of Portland Hoffa, Harry von Zell, the Mighty Allen Art Players, 19-year-old songstress Wynn Murray, the Merry Macs swing quartet, and Peter Van Steeden and his Troubadours.

Sporting a fine case of frost bite from the gentle Arctic zephyrs which recently astounded said Miamians, "Professor" Kay Kyser will present his second broadcast from the Florida resort on Wednesday, at 10 p. m., over WEAF. Ginny Simms, Harry Babbitt, Sally Mason and the rest of the "College of Musical Knowledge" student body will be featured as usual.

Miriam Hopkins and Edmund Lowe will be co-starred Wednesday at 9 p. m. over WABC when "Jezebel" is presented for the first time on the air in a radio dramatization to be given on the Star theatre.

Beverly Adair will join the Swing Fourteen for the first time on "Breezing Along" Wednesday at 8 p. m., over WJZ. They will present "Speaking of Heaven," Johnny Green will play a piano solo and Floyd Sherman will take the vocal on "It's a Blue World." The orchestra will be heard in the popular "Darn That Dream" and the Bel-Aires will add the novelty, "Wouldst Could But Kiss Thy Hand, O Babe."

The concluding installment of the two-part presentation of Edmund Rostand's "Cyrano de Bergerac" will be dramatized on the "Hollywood Playhouse" program, Wednesday at 8 p. m., over WEAF. Charles Boyer again will play the title role, with Astud Alwyn, screen actress, as his cousin, Roxane.

James J. Caesar, 21-year-old violin student at the Cleveland Institute of Music, will be soloist on "Musical Americans," the Manufacturing Company's new program, on Thursday from 8 to 8:30 p. m. over WJZ.

Caesar will be featured with Deems Taylor, eminent critic-composer, and with Raymond Paige, conductor of the Westinghouse Radio Orchestra--100 Men of Melody, and will play Pugnani's Prae-ludium and Allegro, transcribed for violin by Fritz Kreisler. During the broadcast he will use his most cherished possession, a violin made by Bernardus Calamans of Genoa in 1750.
