

John Garfield To Star In "Land's End" For Kate Smith

Abbott And Costello Will Do Old Favorites; Sweet Songs Scheduled To Be Sung By Lucille Manners

John Garfield, a Group Theatre graduate and now one of Hollywood's brightest stars, will appear in Denis Plimmer's drama, "Land's End," on the "Kate Smith Hour" over WABC Friday, at 8:00 p. m.

Abbott and Costello, now on the road with "Streets of Paris," will return to New York for the broadcast which stars Kate Smith in a selection of old favorites and new song successes. In the musical portion of the program, Miss Smith will be supported by the Ted Strater swing singers and the Jack Miller orchestra.

Arthur Allen will present another of their "Snow Village Sketches."

"Accent on Crime," an original drama by Max Marcin, will be a highlight of the "Johnny Preston" program Friday over WABC at 9 p. m. "Accent on Crime" is another thriller in the "Perfect Crime" series. Musical portions of the program, under direction of Johnny Green, will include a repeat solo by Beverly of her much requested "Washboard Blues" and a special arrangement of "Gaucho Serenade" featuring Glenn Cross and Six Minutemen.
