NEW YORK, Feb. 24—(UP)—Steels gained a bit in a market of mixed trends today.

With the United States aviation industry already working at high speed against its huge backlog of orders, Wall Street received new food for thought from the British-French joint statement of intention to purchase about \$1,000,000,000 worth of new aircraft in this country.

The financial district was particularly curious as to what allotments of work would be given the various manufacturing companies.

Also noted was the commerce department's estimate that private utilities would install this year 2,000,000 kilowatts additional power-generating facilities at a cost of \$600,000,000, greatly expanding electric distribution in the nation.

Downfall Of Infamous Thug To Be Told By Gang Busters

"Blackie" Thompson Came To Usual End, Story Will Relate; Sky Blazers Schedule Thrilling Tale

"Blackie" Thompson, known thug and mid-west as "The Handsome Bandit," regarded his personal appearance as an important entree in his murderous stock-in-trade. The story of how this fashion-plated blasted his way out of several jails and cruelly treated innocent victims for his own mercenary ends will be vividly recreated on Gang Busters, Saturday at 8:00 p. m., over WAIB.

There were few jails in the country that could hold "The Handsome Bandit" after his numerous arrests for bank robberies, holdups and assaults from 1922 to 1934. Trapped finally by the police, thru the aid of a woman whom he had cruelly mistreated, Thompson was condemned to death on an old murder charge. Even then, with help from several cronies, he again managed to effect a safe getaway. But he remained true to his instincts of "me, first!" by permitting his friends to be caught in a trap.

Gang Busters will tell how the country's police, roused to determined action, spent sleepless nights in planting their dragnet. A few weeks later, "Blackie" Thompson ended his fashionable existence in the dirt—his body riddled with over 25 bullets.

"Son, if you're going to be an aviator—be the best!" With his father's admonition ringing in his ears, young Buck Madden decided, while still in his teens, in 1911, to help make aviation "an important part of American life." Many of his later feats, including his execution of the mystery dive that solved the problem of the deadly stall and tailspin, will be dramatized on Sky Blazers, Saturday, at 7:30 p. m., over WAIB.

Col. Roscoe Turner will be the master-of-ceremonies on the program, as usual. Trinity Highway, in northern California, curves around the grave of an eight-month-old baby born and buried in 1864.
