

Famous Radio Team Will Be On 'We, The People' Program

Marilyn Hare And Billy Jones To Do Farewell Broadcast Together; Warden Lawes To Also Be Guest

One of the most famous teams in radio, that of Jones and Hare, which is now composed of Marilyn Hare and Billy Jones, will make its farewell kilocycle appearance on Gabriel Heatter's "We, The People" Tuesday at 9:00 p. m. over WABC.

Originally composed of Billy Jones and Ernie Hare, early radio's "The Happiness Boys," Hare died and his daughter stepped in to carry on.

At that time the new team appeared on "We, The People." Motion picture executives were so impressed that they signed Marilyn Hare to a contract.

Other guests will include Warden Lewis E. Lawes, noted penologist, and William Hartfield, of Anniston, Ala., who will tell how he returned to jail 17 years after his escape.

R. G. Pressing, of Lilydale, N. Y., will relate a psychic experience as a challenge to Joseph Dunneigh, who debunked psychic phenomena on the program recently, and two celebrities of the theatre of 20 years ago, William Faversham and Minnie Dupree, will also appear.

The King's Men will sing "Lazy Rolls the Rio Grande" on WEAF on the Fibber McGee and Molly program Tuesday, at 9:30 p. m. Billy Mills' orchestra will play "Lullaby" Hayride, and "Do I Love You?"

Henry Hull, distinguished actor of the stage and screen, will play the title role in "Enoch Crossby—The Spy," based on a little-known story of the American Revolution, during the broadcast of "Cavaladeo America," Tuesday, from 9 to 9:30 p. m., over WJZ.

Crosby, an itinerant cobbler, was a spy for the Revolutionary forces who accomplished his work by posing as a British informer. His name and career were clouded not only at the time he lived but also at a later date when James Fenimore Cooper based the first real American novel on him.

AUGLAIZE TAX COLLECTION IS PAST \$115,000

(Lima News Bureau) WAPAKONETA, Feb. 27—Auglaize real estate tax collections to date passed the \$115,000 mark as Treasurer Frank Piening warned property owners to make their semi-annual payments before March 20 or be assessed a penalty. The total collected represents about one-half of the amount anticipated and includes approximately \$10,000 in delinquencies from former years.

Piening also reported that the first week of personal tax collection totaled \$2,200. The personal deadline has been set for March 30. Listings may now be made at the county auditor's office.

Starring Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., as the mariner, Margaret Lockwood as the daughter of the inventor and Will Fyffe, great Scottish character actor as the inventor, the man who believes that a ship can cross the Atlantic by steam, the story tells of the battle of the three courageous people to gain backing, to get the inventor's engine into a ship. Guy Kibbee, Ruth Donnelly, Eugene Pallette, Beulah Bondi and Astrid Allain, to name only a few. Some, like Mitchell, Kibbee and Miss Donnelly, have highlighted previous Capra hits.

James Stewart plays the title role in "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," and the youthful charm, earnestness and idealism with which he invests the part contribute greatly to the picture's appeal. Young Jeff Smith is head of his state's Boy Rangers, and when a vacancy in the United States senate has to be filled, his name comes to the attention of the ruling political forces who want the appointee to be a harmless and inexperienced tool.

Jeff goes to Washington unconscious of the fact that he is helping to betray the ideals he holds so dear. Miss Arthur, his secretary, is prone to scold at him, but she falls in love with the human, honest youth. Little by little Jeff learns that he is being victimized as Stewart reveals, the party machine fights back, and the white to the tush, the picture rises to truly memorable heights.

There is no other actor quite like Fred MacMurray in Hollywood. He stands a solid six feet three, weighs 174 pounds, has the muscles of an ox and the aptitudes of an artist, thinks after a meal and the cinema social life a trial, and is the man Hollywood can't type.

In the five years he's been out there, MacMurray has played almost every conceivable role. He started as a wealthy playboy and since then has gone on to lumberjacking, engineering, news reporting, flying, fighting, law enforcement, playing the sax and trombone in a dance band, and various other odd and interesting jobs.

At the moment he is a two-tailed shipboarder in Daniel F. Zanuck's production of "Little Old New York," at the Quilna in which he shares featured honors with Alvin Karpis, Richard Greene and Brenda Joyce. The story is a lusty, red blooded tale of the early New York waterfront and the construction of the first steamboat, the "Clermont," in 1807. MacMurray's job is to bring the unusual vessel into being from the specifications set by Greene, who plays Robert Fulton.
