

# Young University Student Set On Westinghouse Hour

### Kenneth Carpenter Will Present Herbert's "Serenade" As Sax Solo; Bing Has Stars As Guests

A 21-year-old student of Drake university will be featured musician on the Westinghouse Musical Americana program Thursday at 8 p. m. Kenneth Carpenter, saxophonist, will play Victor Herbert's "Serenade" as an alto saxophone solo on the featured spot.

Carpenter will be brought to Pittsburgh where he will broadcast with Deems Taylor, eminent critic-composer, who is master of ceremonies, the Westinghouse Radio Orchestra, 100 Men of Melody, conducted by Raymond Paige, and a 24-voice mixed choir, and Ray Perkins, veteran radio comedian and pianist.

The musical program includes four selections from Romberg's "The Student Prince," "Student's Marching Song," "Serenade," "Deep in My Heart" and "Drinking Song;" also "Grazz" "In an Old Dutch Garden," and Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue." The program may be heard over the Lima station.

Brian Donlevy, Patricia Morrison, both of the films and the piano team of Vronsky and Babini will check into the Music Hall for exactly one hour on Thursday. Host Bing Crosby will head the reception committee consisting of such well-known personages as Robin Burns, the Music Makers and John Scott Trotter's orchestra, for the broadcast over WEAF at 10 p. m.

Bing gives out vocally on "In an Old Dutch Garden," "Devil May Care," "Say Si Si," "Beautiful Dreamer," and for his 1850 memory song, "Camp Town Races." John Scott Trotter's orchestra does a special arrangement of "18th Century Drawing Room."

Preparatory to taking over the reins as regular master-of-ceremonies on the new star-studded half-hour edition of Good News of 1940, Dick Powell will make a guest appearance on the full hour program of the series, Thursday at 9 p. m. over WEAF.

Fanny Brice will cavort thru her regular Baby Snooks routine with Hanley (Daddy) Stafford. Edward Arnold, master-of-ceremonies, will present special "Leap Year Day" features, in addition to Connie Boswell singing "All The Things You Are" and "Darn That Dream" and Meredith Willson's orchestra playing distinctive arrangements of "Woodpecker Song" and several popular and semi-classical tunes.

Powell is scheduled to sing "Scatterbrain" and "June Moon." Claudia De Lys, authority on superstitions, and dialectician Charlie Cantor, will join John Barrymore on George Jessel's "Celebrity" program at 8:00 p. m., EST, over the NBC-Red Network on Thursday, Feb. 29, Leap Year Day, when the open season on males reaches its peak. # Two New And Unusual Films Booked On Quilna Preview

### "Those High Grey Walls" And "Convicted Woman" To Show Friday Night As "Little Old New York" Closes

Two new and unusual prison dramas, "Those High Grey Walls" and "Convicted Woman" are offered at the Quilna theatre commencing at the Friday preview. Walter Connolly is starred in the former, with Rochelle Hudson, Frieda Inescort, and Lola Lane heading the cast of the latter. Showing for the last time Friday will be "Little Old New York" starring Fred MacMurray, Alice Faye and Richard Greene.

At the State a drama of courage and adventure is offered in "Submarine D-1" with Pat O'Brien, Wayne Morris, George Brent, Frank McHugh and Doris Weston. Leslie Howard is starred in "Intermezzo; a Love Story" introducing a new Swedish sensation, Ingrid Bergman. The films offer unusual entertainment value in a pleasant blend of adventure and romance.

James Stewart and Jean Arthur are starred in the Lyric attraction, "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," a comedy drama based on the political intrigue at the capitol. A large and brilliant cast is seen in support including Edward Arnold, Thomas Mitchell, Claude Rains, Guy Kibbee, and Eugene Pallette. The film ranked as one of the top 10 pictures of 1939.

A vigorous, compelling motion picture, one with the zest of the open sea in it, "Rulers of the Sea," with Douglas Fairbanks Jr., and Margaret Lockwood in the romantic leads, is now at the Sigma. It is the story of the triumph of steam over sail in the history of shipping. College romances, with the modern college campus as a background, is the problem of "All Women Have Secrets" also at the Sigma.

"Balalaika" brings to Ohio theatre patrons the golden voices of Nelson Eddy and the sensational new singing star, Ilona Massey, teamed in a thrill-packed and melody-filled adventure drama of Russia before, thru and after the revolution. Also in the cast are Charlie Ruggles, Frank Morgan, Lionel Atwill and C. Aubrey Smith.

Judy Garland and Mickey Rooney are starred in the Majestic feature, "Babes in Arms," a clever screen revue of the outstanding theatre talent among the juvenile entertainers. Also showing is "Overland Passage."

## SIGMA

The greatest sea picture ever filmed—a picture justifiably called so—is now showing at the Sigma theatre.

"Rulers of the Sea" thunders underway with the sailing ship Falcon bound out of New York for Greenock, Scotland, in 1836. Fairbanks, young mate of the ship, is ordered by the captain to send the men up to take in sail despite the fact that the ship is straining under full canvas in a gale. One man falls from a yardarm, and is killed. When the ship reaches Greenock, Fairbanks resigns, resenting the fact that the captain had no consideration for the seaman, driving the ship so that the ship would arrive in port on time and shippers would be satisfied.

In Greenock, Fairbanks meets Will Fyffe, Scottish foundryman and inventor, who swears he has perfected a steam engine which will drive a ship across the Atlantic with it.  
Despite discouragement at the hands of the Admiralty and of private builders, Fairbanks finally finds a man who believes in the future of steam, and in the year 1838, the converted coastal steamer, "Dog Star" sets sail for New York. When the ship breaks down, and the Falcon, moving in sight, offers aid, Fairbanks, inspired by the love of Miss Lockwood and by his admiration for Fyffe, works with superhuman energy to repair the engines, get the ship to New York.  
"Rulers of the Sea" has a great supporting cast, headed by George Bancroft, as the hard-driving captain of the Falcon, Montagu Love, David Torrence and Vaughn Glaser. Others are perfectly cast in lesser roles.

Youth has its fling on the screen in "All Women Have Secrets," a story of romance, campus rivalry and marriage in a typical American college, now at the Sigma theatre. With Joseph Allen, Jr., Jean Cagney, Virginia Dale and Peter Hayes in the top roles, the film drama traces the adventures of three collegiate couples—made up of youngsters of every personality and temperament—who dare to get married while still undergraduates.

## OHIO

Affording Spencer Tracy and Walter Brennan roles which are believed to be more colorful than those which have twice won them Academy Awards, and elevating Robert Young to the threshold of stardom, "Northwest Passage" opens at the Ohio theatre Friday.

Filmed entirely in Technicolor, the picture is the result of two years' careful planning. To obtain the most picturesque and rugged backgrounds possible to duplicate those in Kenneth Roberts' best-selling historical adventure drama, the studio sent the entire troupe to Idaho for six weeks of location. It added a few early story sequences at the studio.

The story is one of courage, fortitude and almost superhuman physical triumph. Tracy as Major Rogers takes his hardy Rangers, including Young and Brennan, on a secret mission to wipe out a village of marauding Indians. Thus starts a thrilling journey during which the men carry their heavy loads over a mountain, struggle for days thru swamps, cross a river torrent by forming a human chain, stage a harrowing battle with the Indians and then batter their way back home, starving, weakened and in tatters.

As Rogers, Tracy has the most rugged role of his career and as colorful as those which won him awards in "Captains Courageous" and "Boys Town." Brennan, twice winner of best supporting role awards, has a character role of opportunity, and Young's part as the young artist is by far the best ever given him.

The film has a cast of more than 3000 playing Rangers, Indians, British soldiers and other characters taken from Roberts' novel.
