Seaway Seen as Boon to **Midwest**

BUFFALO, N. Y. - (U.R) - Enactment of the proposed St. Law-rence seaway and power treaty with Canada would release 17 western states from "economic threlldom," John C. Beukema, Muskegon, Mich., said a debate on the proposal here Sunday.

Beukema, secretary of the Michigan-Great Lakes Tidewater commission, teamed with Maurice P. Davidson, New York, member of the state power authority, in arguing for ratification of the treaty. They were opposed by Carroll B. Huntress, New York, Republic Coal and Coke co. eastern sales manager, Bertram D. Tallamy and Chauncey Hamlin, Buffalo, representative of the Niagara Frontier Planning board.

Beukema said the treaty was an economic rather than a political question and pointed out it had been proposed during the Wilson administration and supported by the Harding, Coolidge, Hoover, and Roosevelt administrations. He said the seaway would give residents of 17 states "desperately needed" access to the sea and benefit Buffalo considerably.

Opponents claimed the treaty would cost the jobs of 100,000 railroad and mine employes and impose a heavy tax burden on New York state residents. Hamlin said the seaway was

'sowing seeds of dissension between United States and Canada." He contended New York state would bear \$90,000,000 of the cost and Canada \$50,000,000 and both would receive identical benefits.
